Reeve questions use of fund

Reeve Hinton and most of his fellow members of council don't see eye to eye on the value of a replacement fund for equipment. The reeve questioned the fund's use at the last meeting of council generating some heated discussion.

Mr. Hinton recognized the fund's value when it was used for the purpose it was intended but he questioned the fund's use at the last meeting of council.

"I fail to see where we are doing anything wrong," said Deputy Reeve C. G. Oakes.

"Yes," nodded the mayor. "Using the fire truck as an example. It was obsolete, had to be replaced."

"When you see the recreation budget this year you might change your mind," Councillor Earl Masalski told the reeve.

"The money represents a mill and a half," replied Mr. Hinton. "We've had instructions from the auditor that our surplus is too low. This will assist it," answered Mr. Masalski.

"It (the fund) assists us in a double way," insisted Councillor Pat McKenzie.

"The reeve couldn't be swayed. 'You're talking from the taxpayer with one hand, borrowing from the bank with the other,' he insisted. 'If you call on the equipment fund today for a major replacement, what have you got \$2,000? What if you get a call for a \$100,000 replacement? This, to me, is the answer.'"

"If we could cut it we'd do so," concluded Councillor Bob Drinkwater.
