The North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded held a general meeting on April 3 at the Sunshine School, Hornby.

The guest speaker, introduced by C. Beardsell, Residential Care Chairman, was Miss G. Davenport of Toronto, who is Supervisor of the Child Welfare Branch of the Department of Social and Family Services.

A new act has been set up by the government, known as the "Homes for Retarded Persons Act". Miss Davenport explained the requirements thereof and how the Department proposed to assist any association which undertakes this project. She outlined what has already been done in other areas concerning residential care and also quite ably answered questions put to her by the members of the Association.

A Home for Retarded Persons had previously been considered as the next project of the North Halton Association.
