Town accident-free for 17 days - O.P.P.

The week of March 31 to April 6, produced one of our quietest weeks of the year. Again we can happily report that there were no accidents in the town. In fact, the town has been accident-free for a period of 17 days, and for that we can all be proud. It would certainly be gratifying to see this excellent record continue. Other traffic contacts made during the 946 miles patrolled produced 12 Highway Traffic Act charges and saw 16 erring motorists corrected on their bad driving habits. General occurrences, too, were low in number, with three complaints being lodged at the Acton O.P.P. office. One, a theft, with goods to the value of \$200, is now under investigation, while another resulted in a local youth being charged with an offence under the Liquor Control Act. On April 1, Magistrate's Court at Milton, in keeping with our week of little activity, entertained a small Acton docket. Only two persons answered to charges. Both were convicted and paid fines and costs totalling \$72. This week we received a complaint that makes us think that perhaps it is time once again to remind the town people to be cautious when approached by door-to-door representatives. If you are approached by anyone wishing to sell goods or services, be sure the person is legitimate. Ask for identification. Ask to see his vendor's permit as issued by the Acton Town Offices. Never, never give these persons money before you use or receive the goods involved. Use all caution possible when dealing with these people. Contact the Town Offices or the Police office before committing yourself in any way.
