"ridiculous," said Councillor Drinkwater. He said the general intent of the motion was to reduce the requisition to the town. Ratepayers can't continue to accept staggering increases each year for schools. Someone has to take a stand, he maintained. That's why we made the motion. He admitted the \$30,000 was just a figure.

"You know the situation," answered the board chairman. "You weren't speaking in reality."

"Education is going up all across the province," he continued. "The only thing I can see is the Department has to come up with more grants." He felt instructional costs were high but also felt teachers lacked wage parity with their opposites in industry.

Later in the meeting after the school board chairman left, Council defeated a motion to forego raises this year, a recommendation from No. 1 committee after a hasty meeting.

"Figure dollars and cents," said the reeve. "I can't see how councillors can make demands on the school board and then vote against cuts in the budget."

"I didn't happen to see the school board take any of their remuneration," observed the deputy reeve.

"We must set the example," said the reeve.

"We set the example all year," retorted Dr. Oakes. "They had the opportunity to cut \$2,100 but they didn't take it."

"I'll answer the reeve," said Councillor Drinkwater. "If he put as much pressure on the school board as he's applied to council to cut the budget, we probably would have had a reduction."

Mr. Hinton maintained he had the interests of the schools and town at heart when he acted.

Defer proposal to renovate

Plans to embellish the council chambers at a cost of \$2,000 were turned down by the budget committee of council last week, a possibility Councillor C. Perry forecast when the proposal was turned over for their perusal at an earlier meeting.

Leading exponent of refurbishing the chambers Mr. Perry said he expected to get a no answer. He wondered why the budget committee couldn't cut \$2,000 off their budget somewhere else.

"I supported the idea," said the mayor, "but I agree to defer renovation until next year."

"The motion didn't say next year," pointed out the deputy reeve. "It said defer!"

"I want to wait until we can embellish the council chambers properly," reiterated the mayor. "If thought you wouldn't spend a nickel on this building," needed Councillor Tyler.

A motion defeating the proposal passed with Councillors Perry and McKenzie opposed.

The issue has been a bone of contention at meetings with Mr. Perry charging some councillors who favored the alterations of bowing to pressure.

Companies responsible if employees pollute

The legal bite of Ontario water pollution laws was extended recently by a Halton county judge who found that companies are responsible if their employees cause pollution while "acting within the scope of their employment."

An Oakville trucking firm, Industrial Tankers Ltd., was found guilty on a pollution charge laid under the Ontario Water Resources Commission Act, and fined \$300 by Judge Alan B. Sprague.

The charge following an accident at the plant on June 15, 1967, when an employee allowed about 10 gallons of machine oil to escape from a tank truck.

The oil ran 30 feet across the firm's parking lot and entered Morrison Creek, turning it milky

white. Local residents notified the OWRC.

Judge Sprague also found that the OWRC Act contains an absolute prohibition against discharges that may impair the quality of water or watercourses, and he indicated the company was responsible because it could have taken greater precautions against such an accident.

The firm had instituted pollution control measures, but the valve on the truck from which the oil had escaped had not been marked to show whether it was open or shut.

The verdict of not guilty had resulted from an October trial before Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon, but Crown Attorney Peter K. McWilliams had appealed the decision.

County's 1968 grants

Grants to agricultural, welfare and patriotic organizations plus three local fair boards accounted for \$43,350 of this year's budget for the County of Halton.

A capital grant to the Halton Museum centennial building at \$7,550 and one to the North Halton sheltered workshop for adult retardates at \$2,550 brought the total grant structure to \$50,900.
