## Commission passes \$35,000 capital expenditure budget

Acton Hydro Commission dealt: with and approved a proposed \$35,000 capital expenditure budget at their regular meeting bo Thursday night. The budget has been sent to Ontario Hydro for their approval.

Broken down, expensed were listed as:

Distribution, overhead, \$5,900; distribution, underground, \$5 .-200; street lighting, \$6,000; transformers, \$5,000; meters, 000; water heaters \$1,500; trenching machine, \$4,000; tools, \$200; air conditioner, \$1,200.

Tenders for an air conditioning system, the last item on the bud- ition. get were opened and commission members took another look at the \$4,000 proposal deciding an upright machine at \$1,200 would be more economical and practical.

### Plan 50-60 apartment suites be built on Churchill Road

Plans for building three apartment units which will contain from 50 to 60 apartments on Churchill Rd. S. were discussed at the regular meeting of council

Tuesday night. Council passed a resolution accepting the offer of \$9,000 from Civiero Construction for the old dump site to be used expressly to build apartment buildings.

A time limit for building apartments has been set for not later than October 1, 1968.

"Would there by any problem for 50 or 60 apartments with the aroma there?" asked Councillor Ted Tyler. "With the careful management

of the dump now we don't need to worry about that," opined the Braids, Gay Ellis, Marg. deputy-reeve to Mr. Tyler with a wry grin. Councillor Tyler is chairman of the sanitation department.
