Wrong Cragg

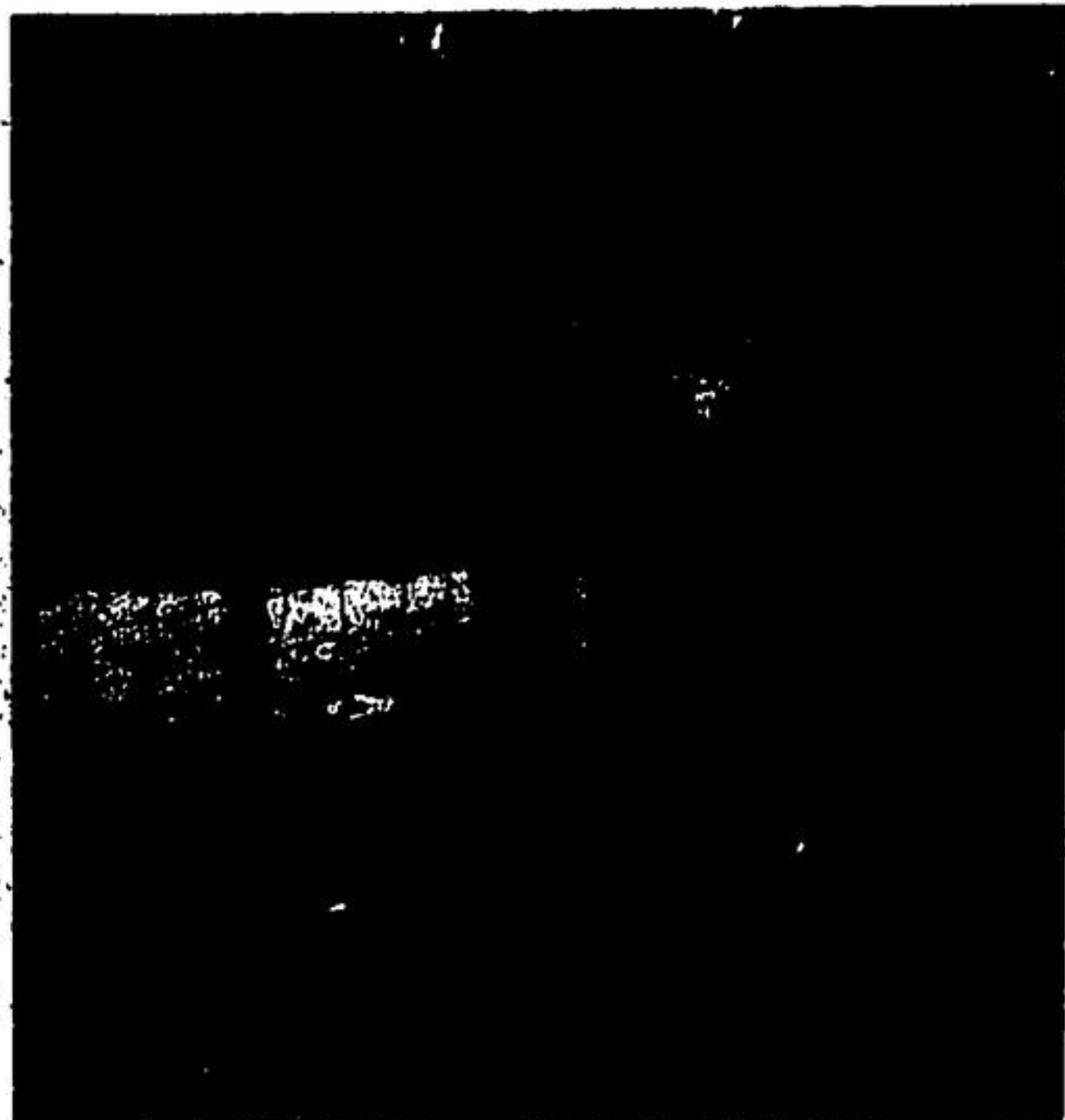
The name of Mrs. Gordon Cragg was incorrectly used in a news story in last week's paper concerning the dog problems in Nassagaweya Township.

Ask engineer to improve intersections

The Municipal Council of the Township of Erin met in the Council Chambers Hillsburgh, on Monday, April 1. Reeve Alex Jackson presided. A motion carried that the Hillsburgh Community Centre Board be reduced to three members, and that the following be and are hereby appointed as members of the said board: Alex Smith, David Barrett, Ross Huxley, they to hold office for the year 1968 and until their successors are appointed.

Council requested the Engineer of the Department of Highways to look into the matter of making improvements to the approach of the 6th line of Erin Township intersection Highway 24, also investigate the first line intersection at Highway 24, in the matter of the culvert across the said highway being so close to the intersection that it is creating a problem for large vehicles to legally turn onto the said highway.

The Township of Erin will go on Daylight Saving Time on Sunday, April 28, at the hour of 12.01 a.m. and remain on until the end of October when other Municipalities revert to Standard Time.
