"Flowers of Hope" will help association build residence

This week in the mail, householders throughout the North Halton area will be receiving a packet of flower seeds -- "Flowers of Hope" to about 40 mentally retarded adults and children in the district.

The North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded, which sends you these flower seeds, hopes you will plant them on Sunday, May 12, Mother's Day, and send a financial contribution to assist in their work.

Unlike other financial campaigns, this annual appeal for funds gives you something in return for your donation -- the "Flowers of Hope" which the Association hopes will be a reminder at blooming time that your funds will help some mentally retarded child or adult toward a brighter future.

This year's minimum goal is \$5,000, according to F. V. Cannon of Milton who is chairman of the fund-raising campaign as well as being second vice-president and publicity director of the Association. In 1967 the campaign brought in over \$5,000.

Two major projects of the Association are currently underway, and now the members feel it is time to launch the third phase of their program -- a residential care program for retarded adults. The Association wants to build a home somewhere in a rural area where about 10

mentally retarded adults could live in a home-like atmosphere, under the supervision of two houseparents. There are many retardates in this district who have no families and are forced to live with friends or in an institution like the home for the aged. The home-type atmosphere of a residential care program could make a big difference in their lives, Mr. Cannon says.

The government would pay an 80 per cent grant of operating costs of such a program, plus a \$5,000 per bed grant on capital costs. The Association has a guarantee from the Georgetown Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion to underwrite any additional operating costs. But purchasing a site (several are under study now) and erecting the building will still need more funds over and above the government grant. A portion of this year's Flowers of Hope campaign proceeds will go into a building fund.

The government has taken over the operation of Sunshine School for the retarded children, but capital costs only get a 50 per cent grant. And the Halton Opportunity Products Enterprises (H.O.P.E.) Workshop at Hornby is still not self-sufficient, although revenue is helping to offset the operational costs.

H.O.P.E. trainees were in charge of packaging the seeds for the Flowers of Hope campaign this year. Thousands of packets will be mailed out this week to homes in Acton, Georgetown, Milton, Nassagaweya and Esquesing townships.

Mrs. William Rowney is heading up the door-to-door canvassing in Milton, with Mrs. Ralph Barlow in charge of the Georgetown area and Mrs. R. Loutitt heading the Acton and district canvass. The main blitz of door-to-door canvassing will take place Monday, May 13 and continue through the week.
