Interesting race in Halton-Wentworth

Coulter seeking P. C. nomination Liberal, N.D.P. meetings tonight

Although no candidates have been named, the race in the new riding of Halton-Wentworth should prove an interesting one. John Morison, Liberal M.P. for Wentworth last term is expected to hold the Liberal nomination, as is Ted McDonald for the N.D.P. The Tory ticket is wide open.

Although Mr. Morison might be expected to have an edge because of his experience, much of the new riding will be unexplored grounds for the M.P.

Ted McDonald represented the N.D.P. in the last election, unsuccessfully. Mr. McDonald is a Burlington school teacher.

Reeve of Nassagaweya Township, William Coulter will oppose John Leonard for the Tory nomination. Andy Frame and Jim Swanborough, both of Burlington, have indicated interest but have not yet declared themselves.

Mr. Coulter has served eight years on Nassagaweya Council and is in his fifth year on County Council. He was elected warden last year. At 35 years he made one of the county's youngest wardens.

Mr. Leonard is vice-president of the Dundas P.C.'s and president of the Wentworth

Association. Employed as a control supervisor in textile manufacturing, he is a graduate of the Provincial Institute of Textiles and attended Hillfield and Ridley Colleges and McMaster University.

The P.C. standard-bearer will be made known at the nomination meeting May 10 at Watford High School. The Liberals and New Democrats both unveil their candidates tonight. The Liberals hold their meeting in Aldershot High School and the N.D.P.'s in Glenwood school in Burlington. Both are 8 p.m. meetings.
