New contestants daily in busy Halton riding

The federal election is just seven weeks away and the Halton riding political pot has begun to boil, with contestants almost daily generating from the woodwork.

Murray Kornighan was named N.D.P. candidate at a meeting Friday night in Milton. The Liberals will unveil their standard-bearer May 14 at Hornby Tower Golf Club and the Conservatives theirs on May 16 in Blacklock High School in Oakville.

Hopefuls for the Conservative ticket are Halton Crown Attorney Peter McWilliams, Oakville Councilor Allan Day and Oakville Parks Board Business Administrator Bill Bateman. Association president Doug Latimer, a Georgetown lawyer, had considered running but later dropped out.

Mr. McWilliams has served as Crown Attorney in Halton since 1958. Five years prior to that he had a partnership in a Milton law firm. A Milton citizen since 1953, Mr. McWilliams moved to Oakville one year ago.

Mr. Bateman joins McWilliams in their first bid for elected office. Among the many boards and commissions Mr. Bateman has sat upon are the Oakville Centennial Committee and the Parks and Recreation Committee of the Oakville Planning Board. He assisted Milton in setting up its first parks board.

Allan Day, also an Oakville resident, has thrown his hat into the race. Mr. Day has worked on the Oakville town council for several years and was elected Reeve last year.

Although only Oakville Mayor

McLean Anderson, Rud Whiting of Oakville and Milton businessman J. M. "Mike" Ledwith have committed themselves as definite Liberal nomination seekers, several others have expressed interest.

Bill Perras of Oakville has listed himself as "a maybe." Mike Muzak, Derek Mason, Don Gordon and Lloyd McChesney are names to be considered as well.

It was rumored earlier Agriculture Minister J. J. Greene would run in Halton but he has since announced plans to seek re-election in Niagara Falls. He lost his Renfrew seat in redistribution.

Mike Ledwith, a resident of Milton since 1946, has sat on just about as many boards and committees as there are in Milton. He served as Milton's mayor in 1957 and has sat on the Milton District Hospital Board of Directors since 1959. He has served as president of the Chamber of Commerce and a long list of public positions, and was Milton's Citizen of the Year a few years ago.

Mayor Anderson served as Oakville's mayor for several years.

Cancer canvass total new high of \$3,439; marathon sum to come

April's door-to-door canvass for the Acton branch of the Canadian Cancer Society raised the highest total to date — and the impressive amount raised at the Project: Acton marathon has not yet been added to it.

Campaign chairman Mrs. Ray Arlic announced this week that her captains, their work all completed during the specified "cancer month", have turned in \$3,439.31. (Last year's total in the house-to-house canvass was \$3140.68, with the marathon walk raising \$523.45.)

It's expected this year's marathon will add over \$1,300 to the grand total for Acton's largest contribution yet.

"The canvassers all did an excellent job and we were more than pleased," said Mrs. Arlic. "We are looking forward to the Project: Acton contribution."

She explained the contribution in some areas was down slightly, and again in some others, up a little. In some cases the increase was accounted for by new homes in the area.

In some established districts of town, it was felt that the canvassers' persistent call-backs accounted for the rise.

Enumerators count noses

Enumerators hit the road on Monday and by this Saturday will have visited each of the estimated 85,000 eligible voters in Halton and Halton-Wentworth ridings. It is expected voters' lists will be on display within two weeks of the Saturday enumerating deadline.

Approximately 45,000 voters will be eligible in Halton Riding, Returning Officer Gordon Blake reported.

Three hundred and twenty-five enumerators are covering the 180 polls. There will be two enumerators at each of the 145 urban polls and one at each of the 35 rural polls.

There will be 28 polls in Oakville West, 35 in Oakville central, 27 in Oakville East, 21 in Oakville North, 17 in Milton, 32 in Georgetown, 17 in Acton and 11 in Erin.

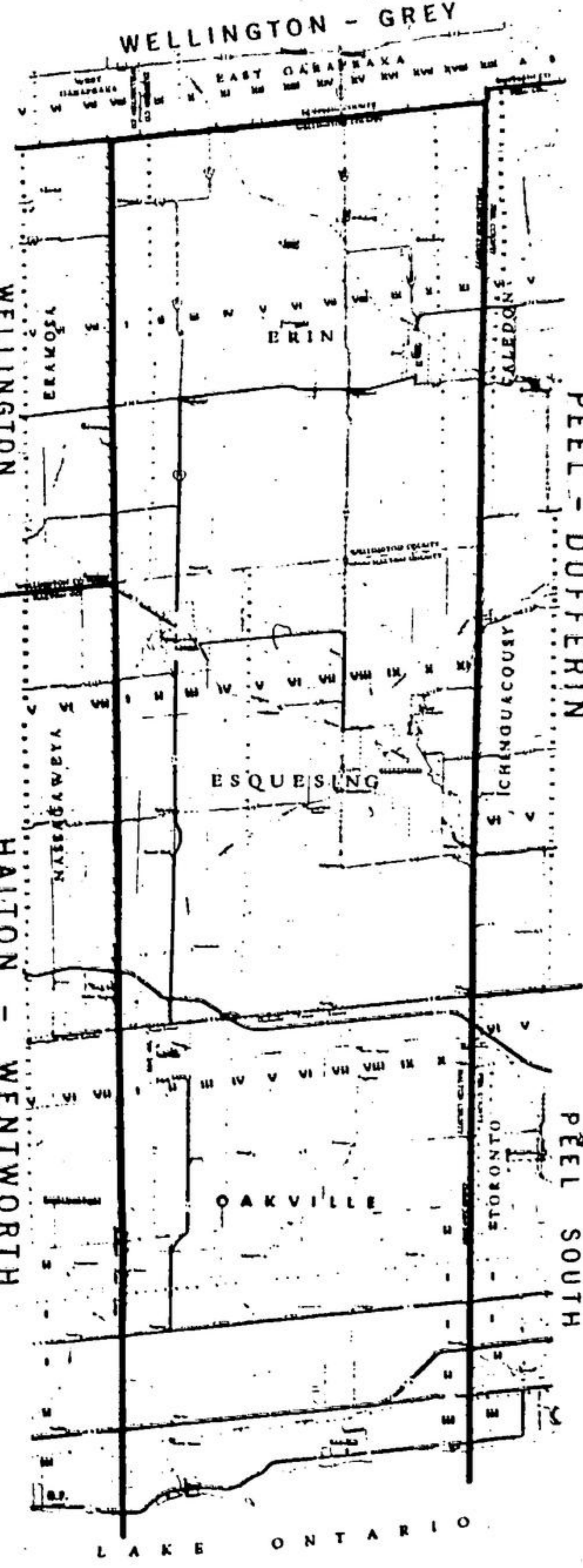
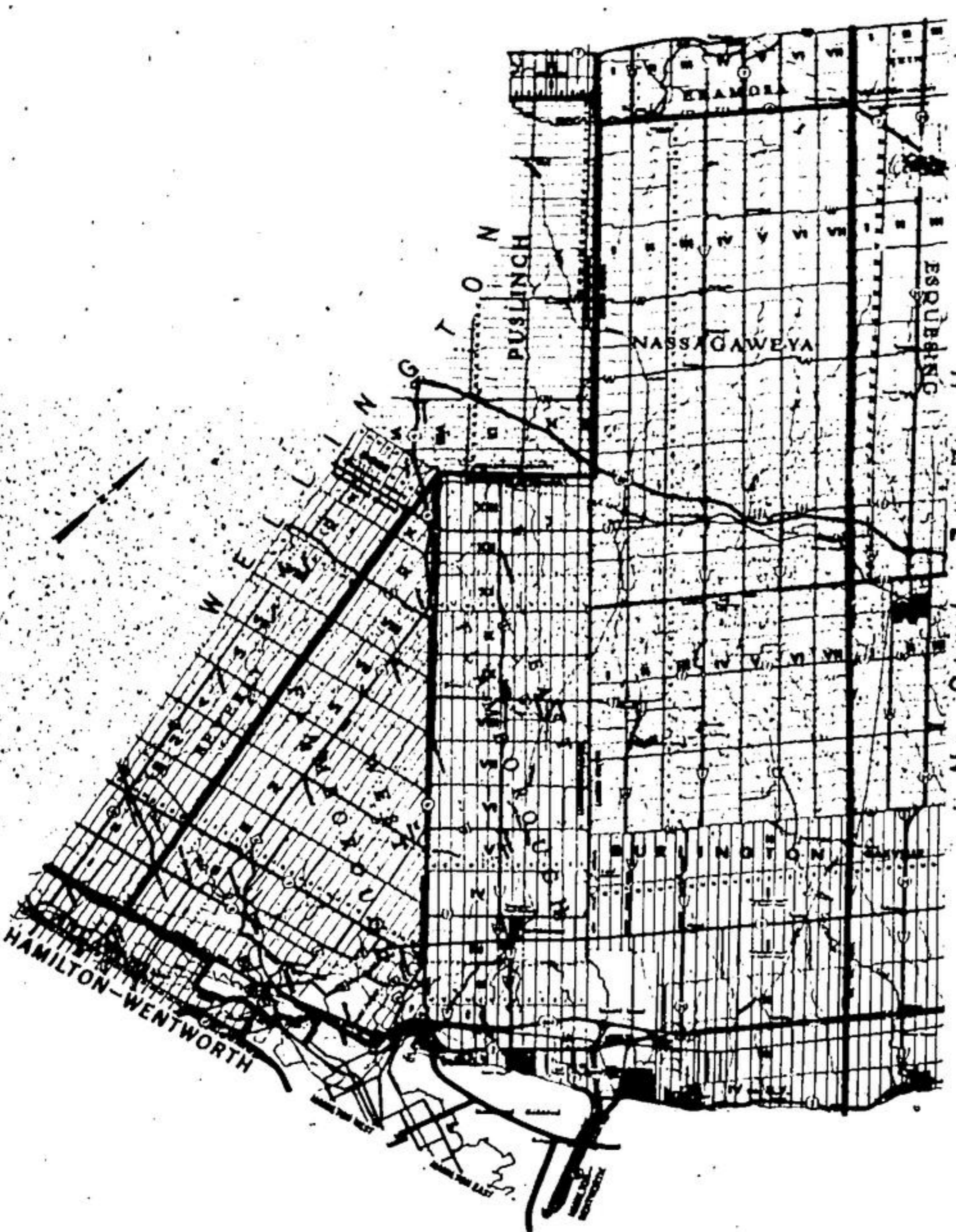

The other map shows the newly-created "Halton-Wentworth" riding which includes all of Nassagaweya Township, Burlington, East Flamborough, West Flamborough and Dundas. The "Halton" riding had a population of 72,524 at the 1961 census. There were 75,467 in the "Halton-Wentworth" area.
