Details Scotch Block dam outlined to twp. council

Representatives of the Halton Region Conservation Authority asked for and received approval from Esquesing Council to go ahead with the proposed Scotch

Block dam. Authority president Humphrey and Brock Harris outlined plans for the dam to be built across the middle branch of 16-Mile Creek to the township bouncil Monday night. Authority representatives are asking anproval for the project from each municipality in the watershed.

First move is for the Authority to purchase the land which is 30 acrespasture, 70 acres swamp and scrutt, five orchard, five cleared and ten acres of bushat an approximate cost of \$80,000. Total cost of the dam is \$520,000. of which \$450,000 is available

by grant. Cost of the entire project is estimated at \$600,000. Mr. Humphrey said the number
