## Details Scotch Block dam outlined to twp. council

Representatives of the Halton Region Conservation Authority asked for and received approval from Engineering Council to go ahead with the proposed Scotch Block dam.

Authority president Barry Humphrey and Brock Harris outlined plans for the dam to be built across the middle branch of 16-Mile Creek to the township council Monday night. Authority representatives are asking approval for the project from each municipality in the watershed.

First move is for the Authority to purchase the land which is 30 acres pasture, 70 acres swamp and scrub, five orchard, five cleared and ten acres of bush at an approximate cost of \$80,000. Total cost of the dam is \$320,000 of which \$450,000 is available by grant. Cost of the entire project is estimated at \$600,000.

Mr. Humphrey said the number of market gardening farms in the 16-Mile watershed had increased in the last few years. Many of the farmers have installed irrigation equipment to pump water from the 16 Mile Creek. Demand was greatest below the proposed Scotch Block Reservoir. The creek almost dried up in dry periods.

Engineering's portion of the annual payment - based on a per capita levy of \$1.45 - would be \$420 and it would be part of the general levy.

Councillor Bob Lawson said he had read reports of the project being deferred but the Authority said they hoped to start it and the Hillton Falls dam this year.

## Mutual aid fire warning system ready in Wellington

Complaints about an "unsightly mess" at a lot on 10 Sideroad near the First Line were aired in Nassagaweya Council on Monday. Neighboring landowners who planned new homes in the area appeared before council to protest the appearance of a lot where Mrs. Doris Smith is building a garage.

Carlo Bryce, representing himself and Dan Dunlop, said both of them planned to build \$30-40,000 homes in the neighborhood but had cancelled their plans until the Smith property is cleaned up. Mr. Bryce wondered if the garage was legal, as it is not an accessory to a home but simply a garage in a vacant lot, surrounded by building materials.

Councillors noted the land separation was approved prior to the passing of the township's new zoning by-law, so the owner could probably build the garage without first having a home because this was allowed prior to the new by-law. Members agreed a legal interpretation was needed.

Mrs. Smith attended the meeting and defended her position. She said she received a building permit for the garage, and planned to build a home on the property later. She has had a well and hydro installed in preparation for the home. The material lying around was lumber and windows she plans to use in constructing the home, she explained.

## Man rescued from blazing car

Alert thinking and a courageous act by Constable Bob Pearson of the Milton O.P.P. force saved a 21-year-old Moffat man from what may have been a tragic death early Friday morning. The car broke into flames after driver Don Haggart lost control and hit a tree on the Guelph Line just south of No. 10 Sideroad.

Const. Pearson made his way into the wrecked car and propped the roof up with his back, just high enough to allow Haggart to be removed. Passing motorists assisted Const. Pearson in the rescue.

Haggart suffered a fractured left leg, a dislocated hip, a broken nose and serious facial and scalp lacerations. His 1962 Buick sedan was damaged to the extent of \$800, and classed a total wreck. He was taken to Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital in Burlington

where he is reported to be in fair condition. Milton Fire Brigade was called to the scene.
