Police reminder

Sweepstakes tickets against Canadian law

From May 5 to May 11, 1968, the six man Acton O.P.P. force, while working 216 hours and patrolling 501 miles, found their time constantly occupied with a widely diversified range of activities. Traffic, liquor, criminal and court proceedings were all dealt with.

On May 5 a report of youths throwing stones at passing autos on Main Street resulted in the youths' parents making restitution for the damages done. Also on May 5, a 10 year-old boy was reported missing, but was later located at Rockwood.

The theft of a \$300 accordion from the Station Hotel on May 6 is still under investigation, while May 8 saw a would-be quick change artist thwarted in his attempts to defraud a local bank teller of funds. He was able to escape before the police arrived. A liquor seizure from an underage person, on May 11, saw a local youth charged under the Liquor Control Act.

Various days throughout the week produced numerous traffic charges and warnings, as well as the locating of four business premises with insecure doors.

Although no accident investigations were encountered during our reporting period, 72 motorists had dealings with members of the local force. Twenty-five of the vehicles involved underwent safety checks, 40 drivers were cautioned regarding infractions of the Highway Traffic Act and seven others were issued citations for more serious offences.

In the courts at Milton on May 6, 25 persons paid fines when convicted on the charges laid against them. Fines and costs noted out by Magistrate Langdon to the guilty parties totalled \$711.

This column, which the Acton Free Press has so graciously printed for us this past year and a half, has given the Provincial Police an unprecedented opportunity to communicate with the people we work with and for, on a scale not previously possible.

If the safety messages we have attempted to pass along or the warning of criminal types active in the area, have saved a life or thwarted one cheat, then the column is invaluable, for every week there is some small thing to remind you of, and this week is no exception.

Recently, many townspeople have been receiving via the mail, sweepstakes tickets entitled "West Indies Hospital Sweepstakes!" How many of you know if they are valid? Does such a sweepstake exist? Are you, perhaps and probably, unknowingly defrauding a friend when he buys a ticket from you? But regardless of all of this, you are most certainly breaking the laws of Canada when you sell them.

This sweepstake, and the distributions of the tickets, is presently under investigation by the

Provincial Police. Don't be caught at the wrong end of the law. If you have received tickets turn them in to the local police office where they will be properly disposed of.

—The door-to-door canvass for the "Flowers of Hope" campaign is underway this week, raising money for the mentally retarded. Wonder if the seeds will turn out to be cosmos again this year?
