Following is the brief Acton Chamber of Commerce presented to council last night regarding the proposed temporary mail on Mill Street:

Since we are addressing ourselves to a council which is well acquainted with the problems of the Acton Central Business District and which is equally well acquainted with the importance of this Central Business District both as a revenue producing entity and at a place where the whole population of Acton congrerates to do business, we shall go directly to the heart of the matter without trying to give a comprebensive background for this plan.

At a meeting held by The Acton Chamber of Commerce It was unanimously decided to create a temporary walking mall on Mill St. between John St and Main St. for a period of two weeks if possible, starting approximately June 10, 1968.

We propose to block Mill St for vehicle traffic, as outlined, and decorate the pavement with live plants and trees, etc., set up benches and generally transform the area into a type of open Town Square.

Willow St. between Bower Ave. and Mill St. and between Church St. and Mill St. would be closed to through traffic andused for parking, also John St. should be made as one way South from Bower St. to Church St. with parking on one

All through traffic would be channelled through Eastern Ave. and along Church St. to Main St. and reverse.

Provisions for a Bus Stop at the Main and Mill corners would be made by setting back the barriers from Main 20 to 25 feet


