**Widely known, liked Mrs. George Leslie dies**

Deeply interested in the community in which she lived, Georgetown lost one of its best liked residents when Mrs. George Leslie died in Georgetown district hospital Sunday, April 28, after an illness of three weeks. Mrs. Leslie was widely known through the county and across the country as a sympathetic, kindly person. She was held in great respect by the many friends she and her husband made on municipal conventions across Canada. Born Marie Agnes Moore at Norval on November 26, 1899, Mrs. Leslie attended Norval public and Georgetown high schools before working in the Bank of Nova Scotia, Norval. She moved to Brampton with her family in 1919 where she was employed at the Union bank. In 1919 she married George L. Leslie at St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, Brampton. They lived on Lot 17, Fourth Line, Esqueping, for most of their married life, moving to Georgetown 12 years ago. Mrs. Leslie was a member of Knox Presbyterian church in Georgetown where she was active in and a past president of the W. A. She was also a member of

Georgetown Lawn Bowling Club. Funeral was held from the McClure Funeral Home, Georgetown, on Tuesday, April 30 with her minister, Rev. F.N. Young officiating. Interment was in Greenwood cemetery.

**Safety council promotes tags**

Would you spend 20 cents to save your life?

Halton Farm Safety Council hopes many farmers will see the proposition as a worthwhile investment. The Safety Council has launched a sale of pedestrian reflector tags designed to help keep pedestrians alive and visible under night time traffic conditions.

The "reflecto-tags" as they are known are small strips of luminous material which you hang on your coat or dangle from your pockets when walking in night traffic. They're only an inch wide and two inches high, but they light up "like a thousand fireflies" when picked up by a car's headlights.

They cost 10 cents each, and the Safety Council recommends you wear two of them at a time. Gerald Capton of Milton, 1968 president of Halton Farm Safety Council, says the Council's aim is to protect the farm people but the sale of tags is not restricted to farmers alone. They're available at cost through the Milton office of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food. The 10 cent price is the price the Safety Council pays to purchase them through the Ontario Safety League.

"We are not trying to make money, we're trying to save lives," Mr. Capton explains. The Safety Council also sells fire extinguishers, slow moving vehicle signs and first aid kits at cost, the main idea being the saving of lives and property.
