Full approval of W.I. resolution "Rural Medical services poor"

It concluded, "Be it hereby resolved that the Women's Institute do everything possible to bring this matter to those in authority for them to use their influence to create a better situation."

You have until June 8 to get name on lists

Approximately 47,000 voters will go to the polls in Halton riding for the June 25 election. Urban voters have until June 8 to see that their names have been placed on voters' lists.

You can contact a revisal agent through your Post Office or with the aid of your favorite party.

Rural voters need not worry about having their names on the list as they can take an oath at the polling station. Any community over 5,000 people is classed as urban.

Halton riding includes Erin and Erin Township, Acton, Essexville Township, Georgetown, Milton and Oakville. To be eligible to vote you must be 21 years of age, a Canadian citizen or a British subject, and a resident for more than a year and must not have a criminal record.
