Approximately 47,000 voters will go to the polls in Halton through your Post Office or with riding for the June 25 election. Urban voters have until June 8 to see that their names have been placed on voters' lists. Revisal agents will collect names from those missed on the preliminary sheet from May 31 to June 8.

Rural voters need not worry about baving their names on the list as they can take an oath at the polling station. Any community over 5,000 people is classed as urban.

Halton riding includes Erin and Erin Township, Acton, Esquesting Younship, Georgetown, Milton and Oakville. To be eligthis to vote you must be 21 years of age, a Canadian citizen or a British subject, and a resident for more than a year and must not have a criminal record,
