The rates for permits at the various Ontario Provincial Parks was raised this year. No doubt many of our readers have already heard the new rates but for those who have not the rates are as follows:


> Daily Vehicle Permit \$1.00 Annual Vehicle Permit \$10,00 Dally Vehicle & Campsite Permit \$2.50

A separate Vehicle Permit is not required for anyone camping in the Park as the Vehicle Permit is included in the Campate Permit. The Vehicle Permits are required for day use and are not taken into consideration when buying a Campaite Permit.

A Vehicle Permit for a commercial vehicle such as a bus bringing in groups of people is \$6,00 per day.

There is also a \$5,00 Camping Permit (for 14 days), which applies to larger parks such as Quetico and Algonquin.

The annual length of stay in a Provincial Park is 28 days.

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
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### Candidates at Erin legion hall
