The rates for permits at the various Ontario Provincial Parks was raised this year. No doubt many of our readers have already heard the new rates but for those who have not the rates are as follows:

Daily Vehicle Permit	\$1.00
Annual Vehicle Permit	\$10.00
Daily Vehicle & Campsite Permit	\$2.50

A separate Vehicle Permit is not required for anyone camping in the Park as the Vehicle Permit is included in the Campsite Permit. The Vehicle Permits are required for day use and are not taken into consideration when buying a Campsite Permit.

A Vehicle Permit for a commercial vehicle such as a bus bringing in groups of people is \$6.00 per day.

There is also a \$5.00 Camping Permit (for 14 days), which applies to larger parks such as Quetico and Algonquin.

The annual length of stay in a Provincial Park is 28 days.

### Free Press Local News Items

--Community participation in Decoration Day is essential. It's this Sunday afternoon.

--Duke of Devonshire's I.O. D.E.'s Treasure Hunt has become an annual event. It's this Friday.

--Three guides - in - training are learning the ropes on weekends at the county museum. They'll be working there all summer.

--Father Marc Gagnon of the Holy Cross Fathers spoke of his order's work in the mission fields of India at mass at St. Joseph's, Sunday.

--The cool, damp weather has kept the spring flowers in bloom a long time this year. District gardens are at their very best, all lush and green.

--Do not remove the tops from tulips, daffodils or other spring flowering bulbs when they have finished blooming. Warn horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food. This foliage must be allowed to die back naturally so that a new flower can be formed for the coming year. Early removal of these leaves will reduce the quality of the flowers the following year, and may in some cases cause the death of the bulb.

--The Library of the National Museum of Science and Technology of The Library of the National Museums of Canada, Ottawa, has just requested a copy of last summer's Free Press progress edition for the archives. The issue also reported on the Chorallers' visit to Expo.

--Almost half the graduating class of the Ontario Veterinary College at Guelph is leaving Ontario to work or set up practice. One graduate is going as far as Malaysia. Doctor of veterinary medicine degrees were conferred upon 65 OVC graduates last week, including five girls.

--Many of the approximately 700 residents at Guelph Reformatory are now engaged in the manufacture of picnic tables. This is the main project at the institution now as efforts are exerted to complete the job before the main tourist season arrives. These tables are made here, in all processes including the preparation of the trees for use. The construction of these tables, for which the demand increases as new parks are opened throughout the province, has been carried out at Guelph Reformatory for many years. The usual order from the Ontario department of lands and forests has been 2,000 to 2,500 tables yearly. This year there will be between 3,250 to 3,500 tables constructed.

## But councillors can all attend O.M.A. convention

The mayor, clerk and any number of councillors who wish to attend the Ontario Municipal Association convention at Windsor in June can do so, council decided Tuesday night.

It is customary for only the mayor and clerk to attend but several councillors decided the educational benefits of the convention should be shared by all. A resolution from No. 1 committee recommending attendance of the mayor and clerk was amended to allow all councillors to go.

The amendment passed but not before a long discussion with the mayor opposed to wholesale attendance of councillors, and an amendment to the amendment, which was defeated. The amendment to the amendment would have allowed councillors up to the magic number of three to attend the convention.

Councillor Ted Tyler started discussion rolling when he asked why the recommendation just included the mayor and clerk. He proposed the amendment.

It would be "pretty rich for our blood" to send everyone, Reeve Hinton objected. He contended there were many benefits to gain at the convention but felt the town could not send everyone.

"Councillor Perry has indicated he wants to go," said Councillor Bill Williams "and he's willing to pay his own way."

"Did you pay your own way to Fort William last year?" asked Councillor Tyler of the reeve.

"No, the county did, but I have paid my own way," replied the reeve later.

"We're compounding the error of cutting the administration budget," claimed Councillor Masales. "We haven't budgetted for this and many other things."

"How do you know?" asked Councillor Drinkwater.

"Well, we cut the administration budget all to hell," said Mr. Masales.

"We just allowed for two to attend," said Deputy Reeve F. Oakes.

"Mr. Chairman," Councillor Perry interrupted. "I attended the town and village section and gained a great deal of knowledge. I'd like to attend this convention to do the same." He accused the reeve, who chaired committee

of the whole, of wanting to keep convention information for himself.

The reeve said two attending was plenty for any town pocket book. "There's no problem here, I'll look after my own expenses," said Mr. Perry.

"I'm no problem either,"

chortled Mr. Tyler.

"I don't support attendance at a great amount of conventions," said Mr. Drinkwater, "but the O.M.A. is one I'm for. I think councillors must be educated. There are areas where we can get a great deal. We should consider sending two or three

councillors."

"I'm along the same thoughts as Mr. Masales," Councillor Williams stated. "We can't argue -- there's no budget."

Mayor Doby agreed there was merit at the different conventions and conferences. He was amazed,

however, some people could find so much free time to attend. "I work them into my holidays," he told council.

Clerk J. McGeechie clarified for Dr. Oakes that the mayor, two councillors and he attended the town and village conference. Dr. Oakes reviewed the amounts allowed in the budget over the past three years for attendance at conventions. In 1966 \$875 was set out, 1967 \$874 and \$900 was budgetted for 1968.

"This council over the years," the mayor stated, "has been modest and careful with convention accounts."

In obvious reference to the reeve's stand, Dr. Oakes said the amendment to the motion "puts those of us on county council in an embarrassing spot because we'll probably go as county councillors."

"I intend to go anyway," retorted Mr. Hinton.

When the issue came to a vote the amendment to the amendment was lost with only Perry and Drinkwater supporting it. The amendment allowing all to attend carried with Hinton, Masales and Williams opposed.

Discussion suggested no more than two or three councillors would attend the convention.
