

Whiting tours riding names campaign help

During his first week of his campaign Halton Liberal candidate Rod Whiting visited Erin, Acton, Esqueping, Georgetown, Milton and Oakville. Included in his visits were a trip to the Royal York Hotel in Toronto where he met Prime Minister Trudeau and

several cabinet ministers, including Paul Hellyer and Mitchell Sharp.

District chairmen are Bill Coats of Acton, D. S. Lelich of Erin, Jack Lawson and George Burt of Esqueping, Walter Sopinka and Sid Gray of Georgetown, Norm Pearce of Milton and Rick Krempalec of Oakville.

N.D.P. headquarters opens in Oakville

Murray Kernighan, Halton's New Democratic candidate officially opened headquarters at 359 Kerr St. in Oakville Friday night.

At the opening he spoke to campaign workers and told them of the need for free university education to all who qualify. He said the extra taxation received from university grads more than pays for their education over a period of a few years.

N.D.P. candidate protests sale of plant here to Americans

Murray Kernighan, Halton N.D.P. candidate has voiced disapproval of the purchase of P. L. Robertson Company by American interests.

Speaking to the election committee of the Halton New Democrats Saturday, Mr. Kernighan called attention to a story in a newspaper describing the impending purchase of P. L. Robertson by Procor Ltd., a wholly-owned subsidiary of a Chicago firm. P. L. Robertson is one of the largest screw manufacturers in Canada and has a large plant in Milton.

Mr. Kernighan called the move "another example of the increasing domination of our business and industrial community by American interests" and attacked what he called the "indifferent acceptance of U.S. domination" by Conservative and Liberal governments of the past two decades.

"The Liberal government commissioned Walter Gordon to do a report on the problem," the N.D.P. candidate said. "He reported that the situation was serious and drastic action was needed immediately. What happened to the report? It seems to have gone the way of the Carter Report on taxation."

"An N.D.P. government would move immediately to stop this process, and would institute long-range programs to regain control by Canadians of Canadian industry. For example, when private enterprise simply couldn't compete with U.S. capital an N.D.P. government would buy back Canadian firms now under American ownership and would gradually purchase Canadian firms available for sale and in danger of falling into American hands."

Mr. Kernighan continued, "This is not anti-Americanism. It is simply pro-Canadianism. Procor is a good industrial citizen in Oakville and virtually all employees are Canadian. But the fact remains that if an executive in Chicago decides tank cars or water softeners can be made cheaper there and exported to Canada, then we have no say. And a good percentage of the profits go into American pockets. This situation will also exist for P. L. Robertson when the sale goes through."

Mr. Kernighan said, "Take Milton as an example. How many of the industries here are Canadian owned? The answer is, two or three. The rest are subsidiaries of American interests. It's about time action was taken. The Liberals won't. The Conservatives won't. But we will."

Mr. Kernighan has a personal interest in the P. L. Robertson Company. Besides living in the town where the P. L. Robertson plant is located, he lives in the

BBG rejects Milton radio

The Board of Broadcast Governors rejected applications for new radio stations in Milton and Burlington on Tuesday.

The proposal for a 24-hour-a-day station in Milton to serve Halton County was placed before the BBG on April 23 by Loyen J. Cassino of London.

The BBG based its decision to reject both on the grounds that stations on the fringes of large urban centres such as Toronto and Hamilton tend to pirate available revenue from those large areas rather than remaining with a local audience.

Mr. Cassino and partners Ernest Honnessoy and William Logan, both of Burlington, had formerly applied for a station in Burlington which was turned down.
