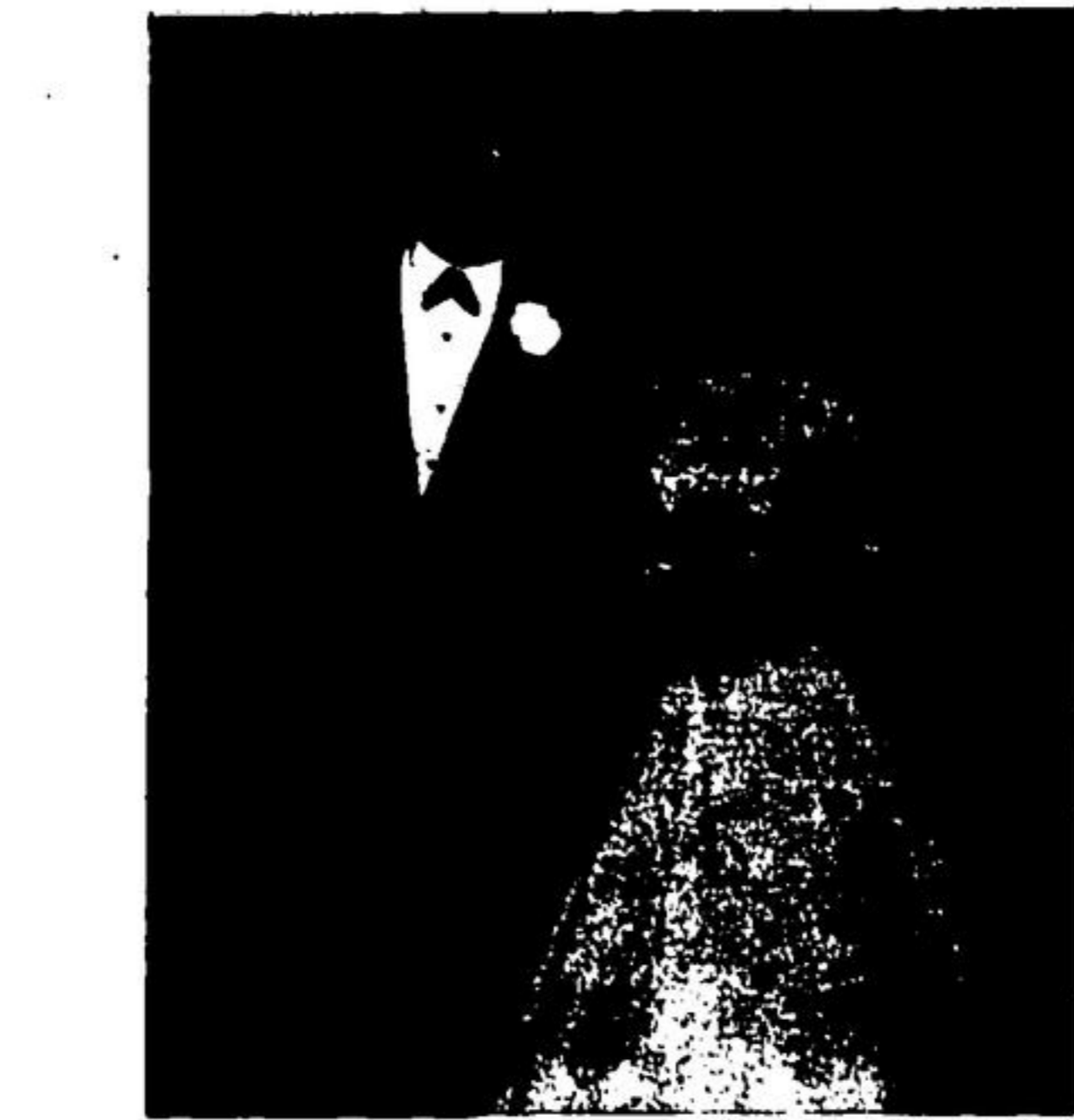
Conservative supporters met Tuesday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Beatty to discuss the coming election.
