The Indian government is now on its fourth five year plan. There is a desire for self-sufficiency and the young people are taking up the task, that the whole of life may be an expression of His life.

An illness which lasted eight months preceded the death of Violet Olive Anderson in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph May 15.

Wife of Mac Anderson of R.R. 1, Campbellville, she was born in Toronto in September of 1914, and attended Danforth Park Public School and East York High School as well as the Toronto Conservatory of Music.

She was married July 14, 1933 and their family included Mrs. Glenn Scott (Doris) of Limehouse, Mrs. George Wheeler (Bobby) of Hillsburg and the late James of Georgetown.

They moved from Toronto to the Campbellville area in 1951 and Mrs. Anderson served as secretary to the Halton Mutual Insurance Company for a number of years.

She was known as a fine pianist and was fond of gardening and softball.

Among those surviving are her husband, sister Mrs. Mildred Craig of Streetsville, brothers Joseph of Barrie and Kenneth of Rouge Hills, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Fassey of Toronto.

Funeral service was May 18 from the McClure Funeral Home, Georgetown, with Rev. Russel Finley of Ebenezer United Church officiating. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

Rockwood village trustees grant chief honorarium

The village board of trustees were told last week by a delegation of volunteer firemen that the mounting duties required of Fire Chief Fred Nightingale were involving his time far beyond the role of volunteer service and that something should be done about it. Mr. Nightingale was not present. Delegates were Herb Saunders and Frank Kelso. Sympathetic consideration resulted in unanimous decision to grant Mr. Nightingale an honorarium of \$200 annually, retroactive to January, 1968 and to allow him, or his deputy, 14 cents mileage while on fire department business. Bills totalling \$4,258.96 on hydro account were passed for payment. Village accounts add-

ing up to \$1,729.09 were passed for payment.

First order of evening business was inspection of sidewalk construction now in progress. Chairman Don Hillis, trustees Ken Murray and J. H. Smith, and secretary, C. F. O'Brien attended as a group.

Mr. O'Brien told the board that issuance of the \$10,000 1/2 per cent debentures, proceeds planned for hydro extension, would begin soon. He expressed the hope that local citizens would take up the whole issue.
