At the regular meeting Tuesday night Acton Council:

- * Ordered census takers be paid \$457.50 for taking the town census. Rate was 10 cents a name.
- * Passed a resolution asking Planning Board to forego an appealation study this year and further asked that the account the board received from the Planning Consultants which was not budgeted for be referred to council for payment. Opposed were Councilors C. Perry, T. Tyler and Bob Drinkwater.
- * Authorized payment of \$824 to Morris Tree Service for removal of 103 stumps around town. Fifty per cent of the cost will be charged to school and parks boards, since stumps in many cases were on property they regulated.
- * Authorized payment of the half-yearly stipend for mayor and council with no dissenting votes.
- Mayor Les Doby presided for the brief two hour meeting with Councilor Bob Drinkwater in the chair for Committee of the Whole session.

Act aids consumers

This week, the Hon. Charles S. MacNaughton, Provincial Treasurer, introduced legislation establishing the Department of Revenue for the Province of Ontario. This legislation has the effect of splitting the responsibilities of the Treasury Department into two departments -- one being the new Department of Revenue and the second being the Department of Treasury and Economics.

Other important legislation introduced this week includes an Act to amend the Consumers' Protection Act. These amendments will further reinforce the Consumers' Protection Act which was passed a little more than a year ago and will provide considerable additional protection to the consumer.

The Hon. John P. Robarts announced the appointment of a Select Committee to consider and study all briefs and submissions pertaining to the recommendations of the Smith Committee Report on taxation. I was most honored to be one of the 13 members selected for this committee which will be under the chairmanship of John White, Member for London South. It is our duty as the Select Committee to consider the 207 briefs and submissions and to hear some further submissions on the recommendations of the report.

Our session started this last Tuesday morning and will continue during the mornings until the session recesses and after that time we will be sitting full time on the committee during the summer, so that the deadline date for the submission of our report can be met September 17 in order that the government can prepare legislation based on recommendations of the committee, ready for the fall session of parliament.

This week we completed the consideration of the estimates for the Department of Reform Institutions and also those of the Department of Transport. Pres-

only the Department having the largest budget, the Department of Education, is now under consideration by the Legislature.

I was very pleased last Friday afternoon to have as visitors to the Ontario Legislature 62 students from the E. J. James Public School in Oakville, who sat in on the sessions of the Legislature for a short time and also toured the government buildings.

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Erect mile markers along Highway 401

The Department of Highways has erected signs on Highway 400 and 401 to mark each mile along both routes.

A department spokesman said it was the first time such signs have been placed on highways in Canada, and their installation would be confined to major controlled access routes where it is difficult to establish locations.

The green and white signs carrying only the mileage number

will provide an easy means of location identification for motorists requiring assistance in the case of emergencies.

The mileage signs on the Macdonald-Cartier Freeway (Highway 401) are numbered from west to east, starting at Windsor and ending at the Quebec boundary. On Highway 400 the signs are numbered from south to north, starting at the junction of Highway 401 and ending north of Barrie.

Duplicate markers on the west-bound lanes of Highway 401 and the south-bound lanes of Highway 400 run in descending order.

The installation of signs at three locations on the Macdonald-Cartier Freeway -- between Airport Road and Inslington Avenue and between Yonge Street and Kennedy Road, in Metropolitan Toronto, and along the 15-mile section east of Ivy Lea -- has been delayed because construction is in progress.

A total of 1,164 signs will be installed when the work is completed.
