What'll be here in year 2000? release government study June 13

A far-reaching study of future transportation needs for the populous Hamilton-Guelph-Barrie-Oshawa area, with projections to the year 2000, will be presented at a special meeting in Toronto on June 13.

The three-volume report of the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Transportation Study (MTARTS), under way since December 1962, will be made public at a meeting to which mayors, reeves, and other authorities from communities directly concerned will be invited.

The meeting will be held at the Queen Elizabeth Building, Canadian National Exhibition, beginning at 2:30 p.m.

A representative from this paper will be present to write a special report on local effects.

The object of the MTARTS project, established by Cabinet order, was to report on an overall transportation policy for the 3,200-square mile area. As well as reviewing existing and planned major transportation facilities, including freeways, expressways, arterial roads and streets, rapid transit lines, commuter railways, bus services, street car lines, and major transportation terminals, the study attempts to assess their adequacy in the light of regional growth predictions to the year 2000.

These suggestions include a regional city developed along transportation corridors adjacent to Lake Ontario, the development of an inland transportation corridor, or a system of new satellite towns fringing the major urban complex along the lakeshore.
