

Rud Whiting big winner...

Whiting circled around the arena floor throughout the evening, shaking profuse hands and thanking all his campaign workers and supporters. His wife Anne, who admitted she was pretty tired after several weeks of hectic campaigning, accompanied him on the rounds.

In his victory address, Whiting thanked all who had supported him through his campaign, with a special thanks to campaign manager Bob Blake. "The only day your political preference matters is election day. From here on in, I have been elected as your representative, and I intend to serve EVERYONE within the riding," he said.

Dr. Harley, in a move to show "my confidence in Rud's victory from the beginning" presented the new rep with a box of House of Commons stationery he had brought along.

A victory party is planned for July 5 at the Riviera Club in Norval, for all those who worked on Whiting's campaign. Several close friends gathered at the Whiting home on Riverside Drive last night to toast the newly-elected M.P.

A survey of polls across the county showed the P.C. hopeful defeated Whiting in 25 polls and tied him in one. McWilliams won 10 in Oakville, six plus a tied poll in Erin, four in Esqueping, three in Acton, two in Milton and one in Georgetown. Kernighan supporters edged McWilliams in several polls.

Hales wins...

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 Hales won every poll there by a substantial margin. Puslinch township gave Dent one win and Beverly township accorded him three and every other one went to Hales.

By 9.45 p.m. it was obvious that Wellington was going to be a Tory island in a sea of Liberalism as results showed the Liberal party gaining seats all around the riding. Voters who carried Mr. Hales to the win although still flushed with the sweet fruits of victory, became more thoughtful as they realized the Conservative party, after a good start, was trailing the Liberals on a county-wide basis.

For Alf Hales and his family the win in Wellington was a vindication of his work in the riding. "Alf Hales did his home work," shrugged one veteran newshound.

Rain which fell in torrents squashed plans for a victory parade planned by the younger members of the Conservative party.

The rain was also blamed for keeping many voters away from the polls but it could do little to damp the enthusiasm in the Tory committee rooms on Baker St. in Guelph when Alf Hales took the 1968 federal election for the Conservatives.

Voters in Eratahda township made no bones about extending the mandate to Alf Hales for his sixth term in the House of Commons. They elected him in every poll.

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 in the area east of Brant street in the 30 to 50 thousand dollar house range. "The middle core went Tory," he said. "But we made them fight for every vote." He felt his crew had done surprisingly well in Dundas despite "procrastinations against us".

The election was a disappointment for the New Democrats in Halton-Wentworth. They made their best showing in south-west Burlington but trailed far behind the Liberals and Conservatives in a majority of polls. Mr. MacDonald did not make an appearance at the Morison headquarters.

Conservative strength appeared to lie mainly in south-west Burlington but the P.C.'s managed to win by a substantial number of votes in only a few of the polling stations. The Liberals took approximately 17 of the 27 polls.

In south-west Burlington the Liberals won approximately four-fifths of the polls and in south-east Burlington they picked up about three-quarters of the polls. Nassagaweya was fairly evenly split between Liberals and Conservatives. In Waterdown, the Liberals only picked up one poll and lost substantially to the Conservatives in two out of the four polls in the area.

By 10.45 it was all over at Central Arena. Most of the Morison troupe had left, many for the victory party at the MP's home in Dundas.

Trustees disagree

Churchill Church Board of Trustees does not agree with the contents of a letter in last week's issue from the Re-Alignment Commission of Halton Presbytery, United Church of Canada. The Free Press prints the answer in full but would prefer not to publish further statements. We feel the different points of view have been adequately covered and further public comment will not resolve the situation.

Trustees Reply

The letter from the Chairman of Halton Presbytery Re-Alignment Commission of last week's Free Press entirely evaded the true issues behind the protests of the majority of Churchill Congregation of having services discontinued there.

The trustees and many members are not only annoyed, angered, and upset but have lost confidence in Presbytery. We feel that one of our democratic rights is being snatched away from us. The rights of the individual are being ignored.

We deeply resent the insinuation that non-members, adherents, and those not able to be always active are causing dissension. Their opinions simply mirror our own sentiments and are appreciated.

All we ask is the right to worship God, to associate with our fellow Christians and to raise our children under the watchful guidance of our interested congregation.

It is our considered opinion that the Presbytery is attempting to "play God" and obscure desire for worship in our own way.
