

"In Acton, 74.6 per cent of Acton's voters went to the 11 polls Tuesday to cast 820 votes for Liberal Whiting, 618 for PC McWil-Hams and 389 for NDP Kernighan.

With 2,489 voters eligible, 1,857 exercised their franchise.

Although there were 200 more eligible voters this year than for the last federal election in 1965, fewer people voted. In 1965, 1,890 voted - 82 per cent.

That year Dr. Harley led in every poll to win with 844 votes. Kernighan polled 386, Masson 594, Timmins (Independent Conservative) 8.

Spoiled ballots were almost doubled this election - 30 compared to 16 in '65.

McWilliams took three Acton polls; the rest went to Dr. Harley's


