CONSERVATION WEEK

July 8 - July 14 has been designated as Conservation Week in Halton. Over 30 community service groups are co-operating with The Halton Region Conservation Authority in organizing a gala week of activities.

The brainwave of Rud Whiting, Halton federal Liberal Candidate, and Oakville representative to the Authority Board, Conservation Week has been enthusiastically supported by all those approached. The following programs have been scheduled:

Monday, July 8: Official Opening of Mountsberg Conservation Area

Mountsberg Wildlife Reserve, containing the 500 acres reservoir created by the Mountsberg Dam project, is the Authority's most original wildlife conservation project. A home for twenty varieties of wildfowl, foxes, deer and other animals. The farm is also experimenting with the winter feeding of wildfowl.

J. C. Thatcher, Deputy Minister of Energy and Resources Management, Ontario, will speak at the opening. The public is welcome at the opening.

Thursday, July 11, Project Preservation

Over 600 children will take part in Project Preservation, planning, directing, and carrying out their own small conservation projects. Kids from the Oakville, Burlington, Milton Recreation Playgrounds; YMCA, Humane Society; Scouting Groups will learn through practical experience and involvement the value of conservation.

The Halton Region Conservation Authority will present individual participation parchments to the youngsters. A grand award will be given to the group contributing the most original Project.

Friday, July 12: Adventure Day

Adventure Day at Kelso Conservation area will combine the excitement of an outdoor picnic day with valuable lessons on how to be at home in the wilderness. Children from Oakville, Burlington and Milton recreation programs will receive instruction in Orienteering, tour the escarpment and the Halton County Museum. There will be swim competitions.

Saturday, July 13: Sportsman Day

Professor Alex Peepre of the Department of Physical Education, University of Guelph, and The Ontario Orienteering Association will instruct 60 people in "finding your way in the wilderness" at Rattlesnake Point.

The Bruce Trail Association's hiking enthusiasts will lead families on nature hikes throughout the morning from Rattlesnake.

The afternoon will start with a bang as the Halton Trap clubs' Conservation Week Invitational Trap Shoot begins. Open to all members of Halton trap clubs, eight man teams will compete in a 25 clay bird contest for the trophy. Future plans for Conservation Week include this event as an annual and larger contest. More than eight members from each club may compete but only the eight top scores will be counted in the race for the trophy from each club.

At Kelso Dam Conservation Area, gun safety demonstrations, and fly-casting instruction will be available.

The Oakville Humane Society "Water-Bug Dog Races" will start at 1:30 at Kelso Beach. Any youngster with a water-happy mutt is invited to enter right away by calling the Authority at 878-8891.

Members of The Ontario Sport Parachute Club will sky-dive during the afternoon. Kelso Pool staff will direct a children's Water Sports Day.

The Halton Sportsman Club Trout Derby will draw hundreds of anglers to Kelso. Eighty dollars worth of prizes will be offered.

The Parks and Recreation Committee has outfitted each leader with a blue and gold jacket bearing the park crest. Part of the cost was footed by the leaders themselves.

Louise McElroy of Guelph has been hired to teach beginner swimming for the six-week period. According to Don Price, she is the highest qualified swimming instructor in the area. Registration for the lessons will be held next Tuesday and the cost is \$5 single and \$9 a family.
