CONSERVATION WEEK

July 8 - July 14 has been designated as Conservation Week in Halton. "Over 30 community service groups are co-operating with The Halton Region Conservation Authority in organizing a gala week of activities.

Monday, July 8: Official Opening of Mountsberg Conservation Area

Mountsberg Wildlife Reserve, containing the 500 acres reservoir created by the Mountsberg Dam project, is the Authority's most original wildlife conservation project. Friday, July 12: Adventure Day

Adventure Day at Kelso Conservation area will combine the excitement of an outdoor picnic day with valuable lessons on how to be at home in the wilderness. Children from Oakville, Burlington and Milton recreation programs will receive instruction in Orienteering, tour the escarpment and the Halton County Museum. There will be swim competitions.

Saturday, July 13: Sportsman Day

Professor Alex Peepre of the Department of Physical Education, University of Guelph, and The Ontario Orienteering Association will instruct 60 people in "finding your way in the wilderness" at Rattlesnake Point.

The Bruce Trail Association's hiking enthusiasts will lead families on nature hikes throughout the morning from Raftlemake.

The afternoon will start with a bang as the Haffon Trap clubs' Conservation Week Invitational Trap Shoot begins. Open to all members of Halton trap chibs, eight man teams will compete in a 25 clay bird contest for the trophy. Future plans for Conpervation Week include this event as an annual and larger contest. More than eight members from each club may compete but only the eight too scores will be counted in the race for the trophy from each chib.

At Kelso Dam Conservation Area, gun safety demonstrations, and fly-casting instruction will be available.

The Oakville Humane Society "Water-Bug Dog Races" will start at 1:30 at Kelso Beach. Any youngster with a water - happy mutt is invited to enter right away by calling the Authority at 878-8891.

Members of The Ontario Sport Parachute Chib will sky-dive during the afternoon. Kelso Pool staff will direct a children's Water Sports Day.

The Halton Sportsman Club Trout Derby will draw hundreds of anglers to Kelso. Eighty dollars worth of prizes will be offered.


