Infractions such as Failing to Stop, Caroless Driving and Speeding were found to have contributed greatly to the causes. The driver responsible for the faulty driving in each incident will be summoned before the traffic courts.

Other traffic statistics compiled show six traffic citations issued, 11 drivers warmed for less serious violations and one vehicle checked with regards to roadworthiness.

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
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
