Candidates at church

"Christian Conscience and Politics" provokes speeches, queries from floor

The narrowing gap between the churches and the world was reflected in the lively political debate last Thursday evening in Trinity United church. About 150 from all denominations at-

tended to question the three Halton candidates under the general heading "The Christian Conscience and Politics."

Rev. Gordon Turner introduced the three candidates - Peter K.

McWilliams, P.C.; Murray Kornighan, N.D.P.; and Rud Whiting, Liberal; with a resume of their education, careers, family, community and church activities.

Each candidate spoke briskly for 12 minutes, with Bill Coats acting as timer.

Then questions came from the floor on subjects ranging from Trudeau's military service to an M.P.'s moral obligations; from federal aid to education to the proposed changes in the Criminal Code.

After the final summing up, Mr. Turner invited everyone to go downstairs in the church to welcome the candidates "and perhaps receive that token that the press - and even the Bible - recognize... the kiss."

There was more coffee and chat than kisses, but the discussions began formally upstairs continued informally downstairs.

A mildly contagious case of Trudeauomania was apparent in the young people outside the church in orange and white, waving plumes and shouting cheers. They flocked into the front pews and listened attentively and silently.

Mr. McWilliams challenged their presence in his address. "We are searching for truth... yet is Trudeauomania a responsible way to appeal to the people? I say it's offensive!"

Later Rud Whiting declared on the subject "I think it's just great! Young people can identify with our prime minister. It's the first time in Canada."

The election isn't a beauty contest, added Mr. Kornighan. "But I ask you, who fared the best on a recent television debate?"

Whiting delivering his prepared speech first, said honesty is party of the Christian conscience in politics. "Above all, think of me as an honest man."

There's a difference between sin and crime, he stressed as he spoke of changes in the criminal code. The law of the land lags far behind practice.

The Christian is obligated to get involved... to inform members of parliament of their problems and to run for election. Mr. Kornighan began his introductory talk referring to the

parable of the loaves and fishes. In Canada, the loaves and fishes are unfairly divided. "We must see everything is fairly distributed as provided by God." He spoke of the guaranteed annual income, and favored continued donations to underdeveloped countries.

Countering the parable, Mr. McWilliams said "the millennium is not here yet!" and there are seldom miracles... the poor can't all be fed on loaves and fishes, and the main thing is to produce.

As former Crown Attorney he has a special interest: youthful offenders should be put on probation, deserted wives and judicial settlements should all be incorporated in changes in the law.

Questions from the floor began their turn, and the prompt answers indicated the expertise a series of "Meet The Candidates" nights had given all three. Some had clippings right at hand to read, in expectation of specific questions.

Trudeau's military service, Stanfield on two nations, guaranteed annual income, Carter report on taxes, encouraging fishermen and farmers to continue, federal aid to education - all were asked of any one candidate while the other two were allowed to point up their differences of opinion.

Several questions dealt with the religious aspect. One asked what member would declare himself "a servant of God in all spheres of life," another, "What is your source of authority?"

When Mr. Whiting, on free university education, said "Murray (Kornighan) will probably shoot me down in flames" but he couldn't see where the money would come from.

Mr. Kornighan didn't let him down - he jumped up to say "The source of money is simple!" More education will result in higher income, which will produce more income tax.

All three were welcomed by the amiable audience and applause for all points of view indicated an audience either simply representing all three parties, or quite open-minded and ready to be convinced.
