MILTON - Something for everyone is the objective of the council committees planning Milton's annexation celebration. Ranging from dances, free bus rides, barbecues and fireworks, the plans are being up.

Mayor B. Best who is heading the action reported a firm commitment with the Carleton Showband of CTV "Pig and Whistle" for a June 28 community ball in the arena.

Four double decker buses have been engaged for the Saturday afternoon, June 29 to provide a free bus trip for senior citizens, invalids and retarded children.

The Chamber of Commerce carnival will be in action on the Martin Flats beginning on Wednesday (today) and plans are being worked out to offer children something in this area.

A free teen dance has been set up for the parking lot in front of the Bryers' Retail store for the Saturday evening, featuring The Shyness and Tiny Hopkins as Master of Ceremonies.

On July 1 at 9:30 a brief flag lowering by Milton Rovers at the Centennial Park with music by the Milton Girls' Pipe Band will be followed by an aerial fireworks display. The co-operation of Hand Chemical Industries Ltd. has been enlisted for the event.

NEW PLACE FOR PICNICS

ERIN - A. E. L. Barnes, director of Con. Authorities Branch, Dept. of Energy and Resources Management, cut the ribbon to officially open the new Monora Conservation Area, last week.

This new conservation area is a joint project of the Town of Orangeville, Township of Mono, and The Credit Valley Conservation Authority. Monora contains 46 acres, is well treed, and provides camping and picnicking facilities for the public. It is situated one mile north of Orangeville on Highway 10.

HIGH HOPES FOR NEW WELL

GEORGETOWN - The new water source that will end Georgetown's current water shortage is no ordinary waterhole.

John Numan of Hydrology Consultants, Cookville, called it "one of the highest capacity wells in Ontario" after testing its output at 1,000 gallons per minute, about one and a half million gallons per day.

"When the new well goes into service it should increase the total water system in Georgetown by over fifty per cent," he said. "This is one of the best wells I've seen. Its capacity is almost equal to the three other wells combined."

SOAPSUDS POLLUTION

GUELPH - A suggestion that the "soapsuds" pollution of the Speed River recently may have come from above Guelph has been advanced. Foam was seen last year in the river at Rockwood Park.

City council received reports on the situation from the general superintendent and the medical officer of health.

Dr. B. T. Dale, MOH wrote: It is our opinion that white foam appearing on the water was due to concentrated detergent which originated upstream on the Eramosa River. This cannot be definitely ascertained until the Ontario water resources commission has completed tests. This could take up to six weeks.

If our suspicions are correct, the sanitary sewer would correct part of the problem and elimination of dumping practices would eliminate the rest of it.

"All departments have been working on the problem since June 10. We suspect from our own intensive investigations that steel drums dumped in close proximity to the river bank contained material, the contents of which flowed into the river. The contents seemed to be a thick liquid which foamed in the presence of water."

"On June 14, we were advised by a resident of Eramosa Township, whose property is on the river, upstream from Eden Mills, that he had observed foam about 12 inches in height at a small water fall June 6."

Smashed pole not replaced

Replacement of a smashed pole on Main St., Rockwood, that interrupted many service lines has led to complications in making repairs.

The damage was caused when a car failed to straighten out at the north end of the "S" curve entering Rockwood from the south, and crossed the double white line to hit the pole.

Total cost is difficult to estimate since three corporate bodies suffered loss. Lines of Rockwood hydro, Ontario hydro, and the Bell Telephone Company were affected.

Accidents have been numerous at this point of Highway 7. Signs restricting speed to 25 m.p.h. are posted at each end of the risk area but strict observance is rare. Northbound cars going down the hill seem to be the only victims.
