"Open" another success

Top golfers in the Acton Open Saturday were Ernie Parker, Wilo Near, Roy Weaver, Dugald Dick and John Goy Jr. They picked up the top silverware while Peter Shepherd of Toronto won the trophy reserved for guests.

Although the long holiday weekend was blamed for cutting into the number of golfers who participate in the annual Acton Open tournament, the event was another success.

Rain, which threatened to fall all day Saturday at the Georgetown Golf and Country course, held off until the final foursome teed off at 7:30 a.m. and the last foursome left only a few minutes after the 9:22 a.m. time table.

Sixty-two golfers including a few veterans and the usual complement of duffers, finished the 18 holes and then returned to Acton for a roast chicken dinner with all the trimmings at the Legion hall. The committee running the event Harold Townsley, Murray Scoyne, Ted Pratt, John Krapek and Bruce McArthur were "pleased" with the

way things worked out. The course, prepared for the Carling Millar golf tourney this week, was in good shape. Golfers reported 15 "birdies" over the layout which to a layman means they dropped the ball in a hole in two strokes.

Ernie Parker, the semi-pro from United Carr Fasteners, finished the course with a sparkling 82 to take the coveted low gross trophy. Runner-up was Andy Nolan who stroked an 83.

The two top golfers were followed by Julian Zajac 85, Lloyd Hiltman 87, Dr. B. Moore 88, Rev. Andy McKenzie 88, Bill Pendleton 89 and Stu McDonald 89. The rest ranged up behind them.

Wilo Near's 71 tied him with Andy Nolan for the O.G.A. handicap trophy but Andy opted out in favor of the runner-up spot in low gross.

Tied for runner-up spot were the golfing padre and M.D., Rev. Andy McKenzie and Dr. Brian Moore. Both sported a 76. Murray Scoyne followed with an 83, Dave Manes had an 89, Bill Nicolak 101 and Don McKay 104.

Low net, based on the Atlantic handicap system, saw Roy Weaver finish with a 64. Roy had a 67 handicap and a score of 131. Bill Nicolak (132-67) 65, Ed McHugh (121-53 1/2) 67 1/2, John Weldon (127-59) 68, Mac Sprowl (132-64) 68 and Dave Drysdale (125-55) 70 followed the leader.

Dugald Dick and John Goy Jr. came up with the Junior Golfer trophy, both carding a score of

102. The unique Guests Trophy for visitors from other places who golf in the Open was claimed by Peter Shepherd of Toronto who recorded a score of 74. Roy Slater, Montreal, 79, Bruce Townsley, Newmarket, 94, tied with Jim Farrelly of Guelph with 94 and Steve Delcanho, Brampton, carded 102. Draw for the set of golf clubs, always a feature of the tournament

saw Barry Inscow's name drawn and he was presented with the handsome bag and clubs at home since he couldn't make it to the dinner.

The tournament committee for next year's Open was one of the last items of business. Bill Pendleton, John Goy Sr., Dr. Brian Moore, Andy Nolan and "Scotty" McCristall were selected for the job.
