Land query misunderstood

Yaremko legally right, morally wrong?

A query raised in Nassagoywa Township council's June 17 meeting questioning the moral, rather than legal aspects of Ontario Social and Family Services Minister John Yaremko's land dealings in the township, has been widely misunderstood.

Councillor Mrs. Anne MacArthur wondered out loud at that meeting, if Mr. Yaremko might have used inside information received through his position in the legislature, to exact general land separations in Nassagoywa. She felt "it was strange Mr. Yaremko

should suddenly decide to separate his land, after he had spoken to both council and planning board condemning such separations."

The minister's land separations were completed just a few days prior to the passing of new provincial legislation, requiring landowners wanting separations to appear before the local committee of adjustment and pay a fee into the capital reserve fund, in Nassagoywa's case, the fee is \$500 per separation. Prior to June 1, separations were allowed

without a hearing if the parcel was in excess of 10 acres.

Although both Reeve William Coulter and township clerk J. C. McIntyre told the council Mr. Yaremko was entirely within his rights, and had done nothing illegal, the story became distorted and twisted when it appeared in several newspapers. Reports indicated the cabinet minister had been guilty of at least indiscretion.

Mr. Yaremko pointed out to his critics that the new legisla-

tion was common knowledge a month before it was passed, and anyone interested could have found out about the impending change in separation procedures. He appeared before the Nassagoywa planning board's last meeting to justify his actions.

N.D.P. member Dr. Morton Shulman heard of the controversy and questioned both Mr. Yaremko and Premier John Roberts on the subject during a meeting of the House last week. More questions were expected later this week.

Clerk McIntyre explained Mr. Yaremko's dealings were no different than that of several other people. There were 73 land separations in the township during March, April and May of this year. The clerk said press coverage of the matter had been "misleading, and on the verge of being incorrect." All township separations are registered in the Milton registry office at

Milton, not in Toronto as some newspapers informed. He also clarified a statement in one paper which said dozens of people had made separations -- it should have said dozens of separations had been made.

Mrs. MacArthur told council Thursday she had taken a survey of some 30 people and none of them were aware the new amendment was coming into effect. "I take exception to the idea that this was general knowledge," she said.

She said she brought the matter up and had asked a sensible question. "I know it was legally right but I still feel it was morally wrong for Mr. Yaremko to make all this speeches about keeping Nassagoywa green, fresh and picturesque and then to go and mislead it."

"I feel I was protecting the people of Nassagoywa and they have a right to know what is going on," she said.
