One of the major attractions of the first Ontario Jamboree at Kelso Conservation Area near Milton August 17 to 24, will be "Youth and His World" — an Expo approach to the interests of youth.

Thousands of Scouts from Ontario and their guests from all the Provinces of Canada, the United States and Caribbean Countries will be able to explore their many interests and concerns.

"Youth and His Ambitions" pavilion will feature vocations of the future. The Department of Education and the Community Programs Division have co-operated to present a look to the future in leisure time vocations.

"Youth Finds a Place to Stand" will feature the Oscar Award winning Ontario film "A Place to Stand." The field of education will be presented in the "Youth and His Dreams" pavilion through science exhibits.

The "Brotherhood of Man" centre will allow the Scout to explore his faith and the opportunity to mix with some of Canada's interesting ethnic citizens.

A real swinging corner will be the popular "Youth and His Music" with pop groups, a search for talent and a "Listen In."
