Gideons visit Ebenezer Stress value of Bible

The Gideons, that international, interdenominational organization which started work in Canada in 1911, were in charge of the service at Ebenezer on Sunday. Murray Coles and Harold Page took part. The junior choir sang, "Ring the Bells of Heaven," and Tammo Thomson sang a solo, "Jesus is our Shepherd."

The scripture, from the 7th chapter of 11 Kings, dealt with a time of famine and hardship. Leprosy is a symbol of sin, and sin ends in death. Four leprosy men said to each other, "Why do we sit here until we die? If we go to the camp of the Syrians if they spare our lives we shall live, and if they kill us, we shall die."

They found the enemy had fled, leaving food and treasures behind them. So the lepers feasted and plundered until they said to each other, "We are not doing right. This day is a day of good news; if we are silent and wait until morning light, punishment will overtake us; now therefore let us go and tell the King's household." The king had their story checked, and the word of the Lord was found to be true.

There are 2,250 Gideons in 175 camps across Canada, as well as 1,200 members of the Ladies' Auxiliary. More than 200,000 youth testaments are placed each year.

Partial or complete scriptures are also placed in weather observation stations, fire look-out towers, commercial fishing boats

on the east and the west coasts, universities, libraries, hotels and motels. There is also the Gideon memorial Bible plan, by which one can give one or more Bibles in memory of a loved one.

Recently the 75 millionth copy was placed in Little Rock, Arkansas. Construction men were working there on a government project, under great pressure. The paymaster began to gamble, until he was so far in debt, he went to his hotel room, with a little gun. He picked up the Bible that was there, began to read it, and decided not to end his life. The next day, the keeper of the gambling den was located, he "swiped" the Bible, and became a respectable businessman. The paymaster owed his life to the Gideon Bible.

"This is a day of good tidings, and we hold our peace." In 72 countries, people find Bibles the bread and water of life. zo, Tom Bousfield and others. A new plate has also been installed to give the diamond a brand new "home."

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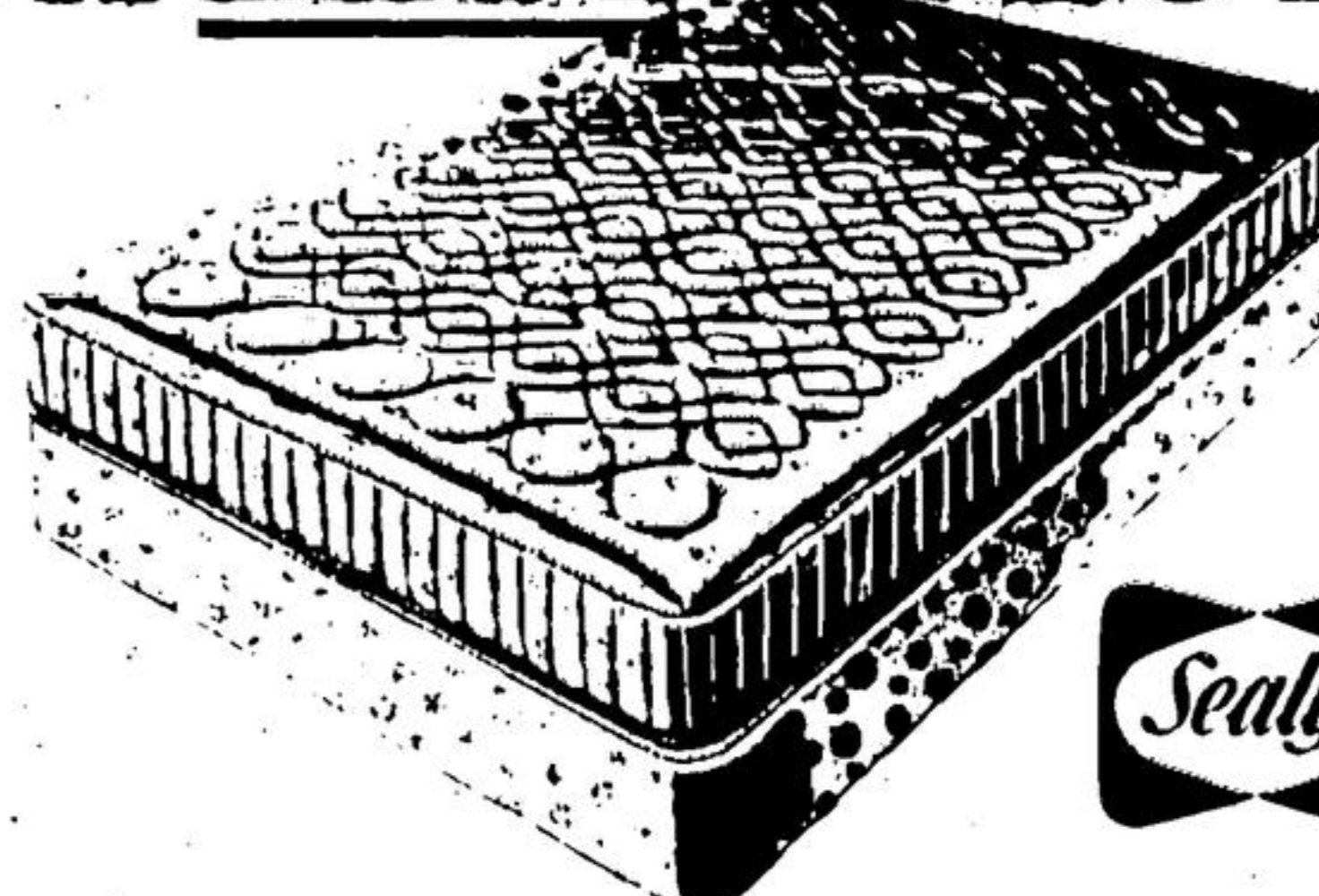
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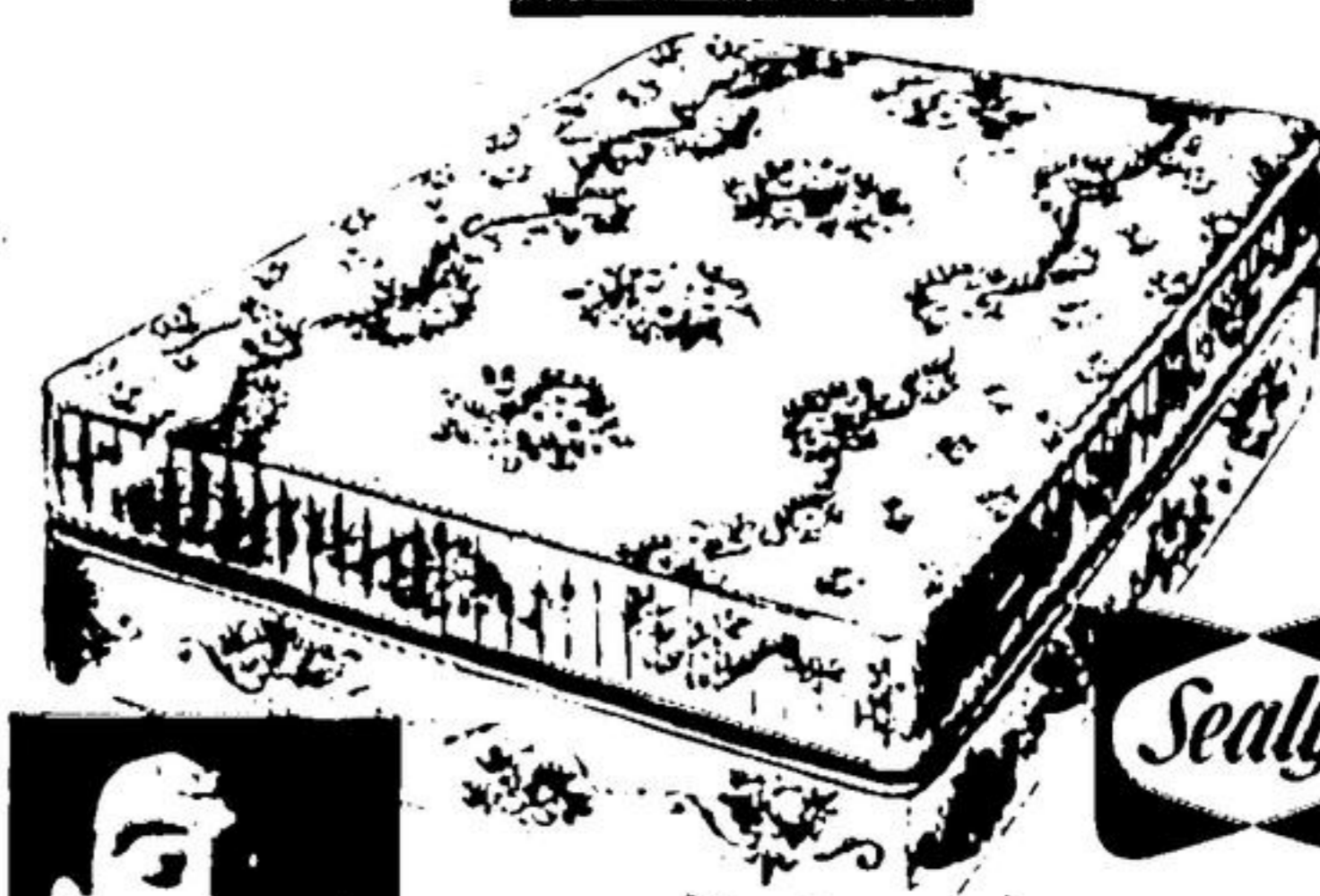
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
