Correspondence at Esquimaux council Monday night included a letter from Nassagaweya councillor Mrs. Anne MacArthur asking action over water wells at Milton Heights which have been declared unfit for drinking for two years.

"I feel it is my responsibility as a Nassagaweya councillor," Mrs. MacArthur wrote, "to get something done for the people of Milton Heights. A meeting between Esquimaux, Nassagaweya and Milton failed to resolve anything but Milton wouldn't consider doing anything until their amputation problem was over."

One hundred ratepayers signed a petition to seek action from the two township councils. The area involved is on the town line between the two townships.

Esquimaux council agreed to a suggestion that committees from both township councils meet to discuss the pollution of the wells, before meeting with Milton.

Milton's water supply from the Kelsa Conservation Area runs close to Milton Heights and residents hope to tap into it.

### Ask approval school addition

A letter from the township Public School Board requested Esquising Council to seek Ontario Municipal Board approval for a proposed addition to Pineview school.

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### Erin twp. shows brisk land business

Erin Township showed the greatest transfer of property in Wellington County last year, Ian W. McLaugh assessment commissioner revealed in his annual report.

There are 1,565 properties in Erin townships. Approximately 44 per cent, or 688 properties, were transferred during 1967.

In Puslinch township, with 1,473 properties, 202 transfers were made. Fergus showed 206 properties transferred out of a total of 1,500.

The county as a whole, with 17,680 properties had 2,581 transferred.
