Under the amendments, effective September 1, 1968, farm tractors and self-propelled farm implements will, when travelling on a highway, have to wear the red and orange "slow-moving vehicle" signs currently used on drawn implements...

The revisions also prohibit anyone from travelling in a house or boat trailer when it is procoeding along a highway.
