ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Township of Esquesing...

COMMENCING at the westerly angle of Registered Plan 772 for the Town of Acton;

THENCE south thirty-nine degrees one minute west along the north-westerly limit of Lot 27...

THENCE south nine degrees fourteen minutes twenty seconds east along the easterly limit of the said travelled road...

THENCE easterly along the water's edge of the said stream three hundred and eighteen feet more or less to its intersection with the limit between north-west half and the southeast half of the southwest half of Lot 27;
