Other-drawn heroes of the early 1950's included Tarzan, Hopalong Cassidy, Ella Cinders, Napoleon (a dog), Snoozums, The Captain and the Kids, and Flash Gordon.

Coverage of the Queen's Coronation and the 1939 Royal visit show the beginning of the free royalty.

In 1939, the papers thought King George was being very modern in having a liking for a few gentlemanly sports... and probably felt they were almost overstepping the line in investigating his private life.

Prize money will be paid to competitors having the highest aggregate scores, and the evening will be concluded with swimming and a banquet. 4-H members and Junior Farmers taking part in the competition are reminded that the competition begins at 9:30 a.m., and buses will leave Milton Fair Grounds at 8:45 a.m. and Acton at 9:00 a.m. The buses will leave Terra Cotta at about 7:30 p.m. Those taking part are also reminded to bring a lunch.

HALTON 4-H TRACTOR CLUB

A practical lesson on tuning the electrical system of a tractor was given at the third regular meeting of the Halton 4-H Tractor Club, held at Milton Equipment Co. on the Base Line.

President Murray McCaig opened the July 30 meeting with the 4-H Pledge. After the reading of the minutes and roll call by secretary Bob McGee, the Milton Fair display committee was chosen. The committee consists of Murray McCaig, Doug Stokes, Bob McGee, John Nurse and Neil Robertson.

With business completed, the president turned the meeting over to club leader Neil McLaughlin. Mr. McLaughlin introduced Bob Scott, a Massey Ferguson sales representative, formerly a service representative for the same firm, who conducted the evening's meeting. The program consisted of a practical lesson on fundamental servicing of a tractor's electrical system. After explaining the parts the members took part in tuning one of the tractors in the shop. After it was running smoothly, Mr. Scott demonstrated a P.T.O. brake - type dynamometer (an instrument measuring horsepower) with the tractor we had tuned. He also demonstrated how to adjust the timing properly, and how this could develop the tractor's maximum horsepower.

The program ended on this point and Neil Robertson thanked Mr. Scott for his excellent demonstration, and Mr. Apps for the use of his shop.

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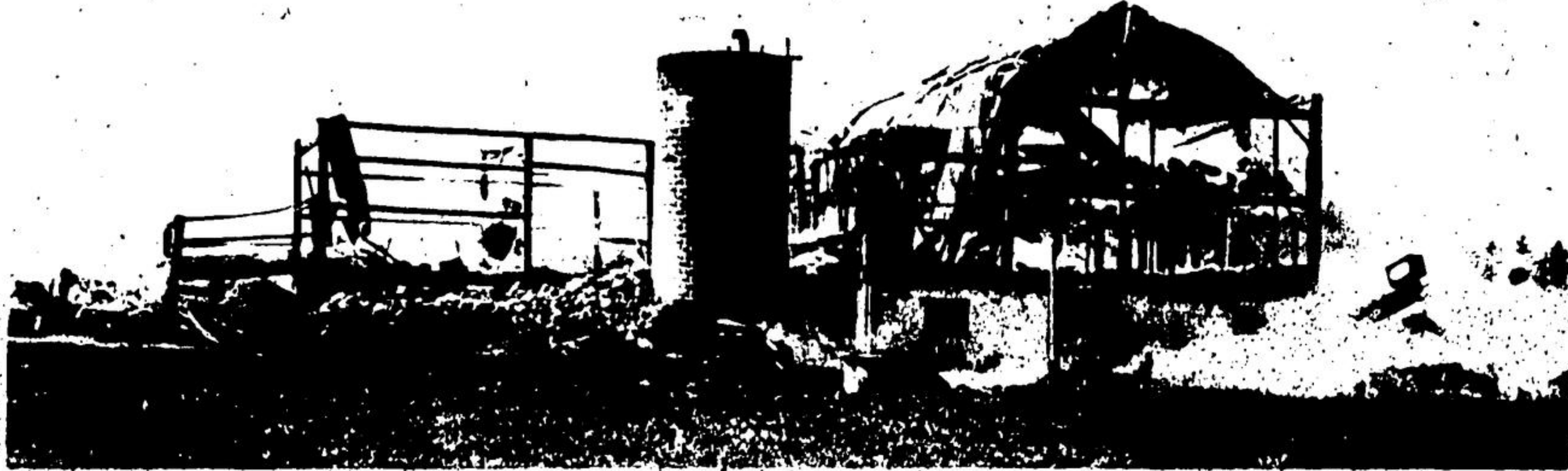
