SCHEDULE "A"

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Township of Esqueving, in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario, being composed of part of Lot 27 in Concession 2 in the Township of Esqueving containing an area of 69.787 acres more or less and which said parcel or tract of land and premises is more particularly described as follows:

COMMENCING at the westerly angle of Registered Plan 772 for the Town of Acton;

THENCE south thirty-nine degrees one minute west along the north-westerly limit of Lot 27, being also the south-westerly limit of Queen Street, one thousand one hundred and seventy-nine and thirty-four one-hundredths feet to its intersection with a travelled road running northerly and southerly through the southwest half of Lot 27;

THENCE south nine degrees fourteen minutes twenty seconds east along the easterly limit of the said travelled road commonly known as Mill Street, nine hundred and thirty feet more or less to its intersection with a small stream running westerly through the said half Lot;

THENCE easterly along the water's edge of the said stream three hundred and eighteen feet

THENCE south thirty-eight degrees thirty-eight minutes west along the southeasterly limit of Registered Plan 772 for the Town of Acton, six hundred and seventy-three and two one-hundredths feet to the southerly angle thereof;

project management, planning, design, and supervision of construction of buildings in the complex and site development. Raymond Moriyma is planning and architectural consultant.

Erindale College offers University of Toronto degree courses in general arts and general science, and credit and non-credit evening extension courses. Since Erindale is an integral part of U of T, all members of the teaching staff are members of departments of the University. Although undergraduate students receive their instruction on the Erindale campus, many of the teaching staff also lecture on the Toronto St. George Campus, and graduate students may work at both campuses.

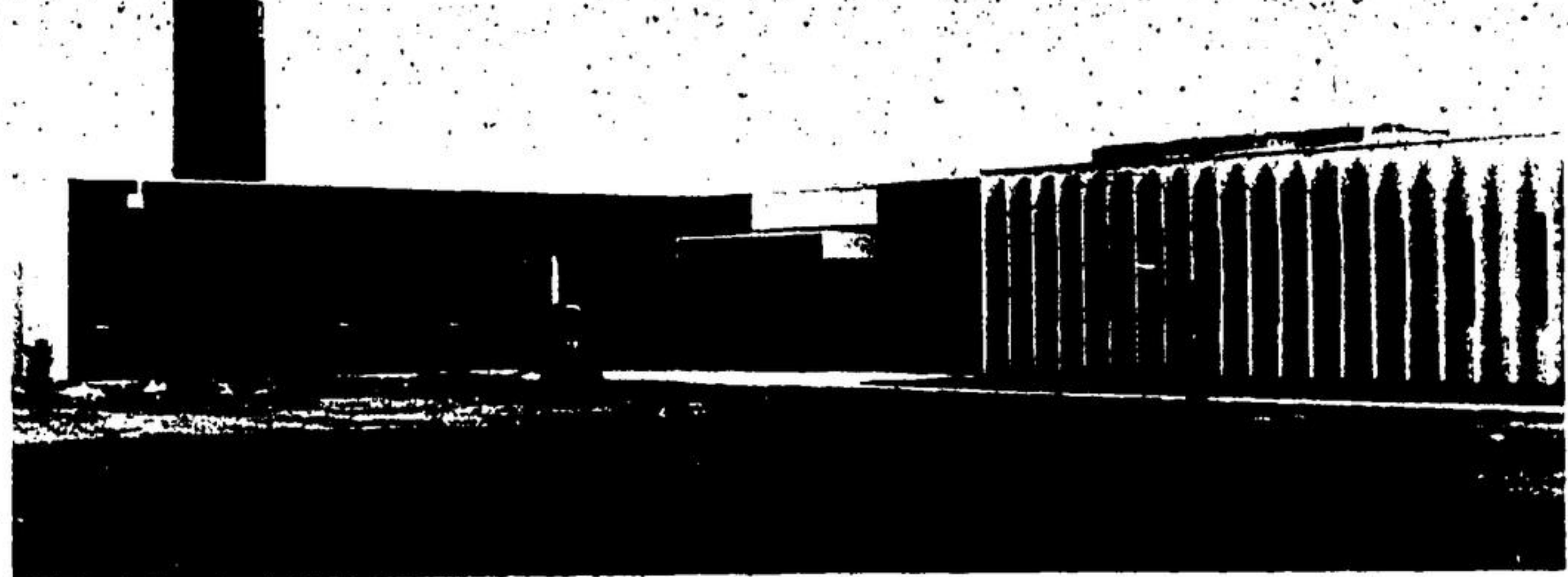
The College is located on a 200 acre campus between Erin-

dale and Streetsville on the east side of Mississauga (Streetsville) Road, three-quarters of a mile north of the Dundas (No. 5) Highway. Its present building, which will be put to other uses when its temporary academic role has been completed, contains lecture and class rooms, science laboratories, a language laboratory, closed circuit television teaching equipment, a computer connected with the University of Toronto's computer centre on the St. George Campus, a library of 60,000 volumes, book store, cafeteria, student office and common rooms, and staff offices. A football field has just been constructed. Until other transportation services are available, Erindale College operates its own free bus service for students and staff which makes connections with the east-west subway at the Fallington station in Toronto, the GO transit station at Clarkson, and the St. George Campus.



THE FIRST EXPANSION at University of Toronto's Erindale College south of Streetsville will include a \$4,000,000 building housing research, research communal, a vivarium and undergraduate labs, which will be completed next year. This model depicts the modern buildings that are planned. An enrolment

of 385 students is anticipated for September, with eventual plans to accommodate 5,000 on the campus. The college serves Halton and Peel Counties and the West Metro area. (A. D. Margison & Assoc. Ltd., Consulting Professional Engineers)



THE PRESENT ERINDALE COLLEGE is operating from this modernistic building off Mississauga Road south of Streetsville. Last year 155 students enrolled and attended lectures in the first building; at present, renovations are underway to make the whole building available for lectures for up to 400 students

and the administration department is moving to adjacent homes on the property. By the fall of 1969, the new college layout will be operating. The College owns 200 acres of scenic, wooded land bordering a creek and conservation area, yet only about one-third of the property will be utilized as campus.

Catering to "commuter" students

Erindale College of the University of Toronto is a co-related educational entity designed to provide, on completion, equal study and teaching environment for both resident and commuter students. It is planned that in the finished complex separate facilities will be provided for the "commuter" enrolment with individual study areas allotted to each student.

On completion, Erindale College will have a student capacity of 5,000. This initial phase will provide space for 2,000. The unusual feature of Erindale's campus is its concept of integrated design in which all buildings are interconnected to form a complete teaching and

study complex rather than the conventional dispersion of separate buildings. This thinking is reflected in the planned co-ordinated underground parking for both residents and day students. This new concept, developed by the staff of the University, is reflected in the planning and development for the facilities by A. D. Margison and Associates Limited. Margison was retained by the University of Toronto Board of Governors as prime consultant. They have carried out all site and building plan studies and have completed the engineering and architectural design working closely with the U of T Physical Plant Department. Raymond Moriyma has been retained by Margison for the architectural critique and J. Austin Floyd as landscape architect. The tender call for the first phase of expansion went out last week and is due August 29. On award of tender, Margison & Associates will carry out the supervision of construction and serve as Project Manager.

Meet to discuss water

A joint meeting of Milton, Esqueving and Nassagaweya Councils will be held in the near future to discuss the possible sale of Milton water to the townships for residents of Milton Heights and Peru areas where polluted wells have been a problem for two years. No date was established in telephone calls between the three municipalities last night (Tuesday) but as soon as the township officials can agree upon a suitable date, a meeting will be called.

Residents of the two township centres have petitioned their respective councils for water services from Milton's Koleso main, which passes the north end of Milton Heights village on its way to the town. Well pollution, blamed on septic tank overflow mixing with the water sources feeding the village's private wells, has caused housewives to boil all well water used for drinking and cooking purposes. Some are even buying water.

In letters read at Tuesday's meeting of Milton Council, both townships requested a joint meeting to discuss the possible purchase of town water. Milton councillors agreed quickly to meet with them but three suggested dates for August meetings were not suitable to the township representatives. Meanwhile, the town council has scheduled a meeting for later in August with its auditor, planning consultant, lawyer, planning board and committee of adjustment, to make elaborate plans for annexing another 1,540 acres of Oakville and Esqueving to the town on January 1—and Mayor Brian Best promises the consideration of water for users outside the town boundaries will be one of the main considerations at the meeting. "We have to know more about what our own requirements are first," he said.
