3,000 Scouts invade Kelso next week

Nearly 3,000 Boy Scouts from every province in Canada, some from the U.S., the Bahamas, Nassau and Jamaica will occupy a ready-made city at Kelso Saturday for the week-long Ontario Scout Jamboree.

Among them will be John van der Kooy, the sole Acton scout to join the large group in the unique event.

The jamboree, with "Adventure in Brotherhood" as its theme, lasts from August 17 to 24.

It's the result of two years' planning and will require a service staff of 285 people plus about 200 leaders.

Estimated cost is \$11,000, of which \$6,000 goes to feed the boys. They're expected to nibble on a mile and a half of hot dogs and use nearly 10 tons of charcoal and 63,000 paper plates and cups.

A giant supermarket will be set up to dispose of over 1,000 cases of canned goods, 20,000 quarts of milk, 8,000 loaves of bread, 40,000 eggs and all the other necessities required by hungry boys.

Water services and garbage pick-up are being provided by the Town of Milton. Thirty-five thousand gallons of water will flow daily through a three-quarter mile water line.

One of the highlights of the event will be the "Youth and his World" theme, an Expo approach to interest boys. This will allow the Scouts to explore their many interests and concerns.

Community Programs Branch of the Ontario Government will help out with the organization of "Youth and his World." Deputy Camp Chief Joe Turner said this part of the program was

important as it exposed the boys to use of leisure time as a youth and adult as well.

The boys will be taught about leadership in leisure activities and the importance of leisure activities, and be introduced to the possibility of employment in leisure. This would encompass jobs to do with recreation, Scouting and the like.

One section of "Youth and his World" will be youth and his music. This will include various pop bands "making the sound youngsters like to hear," folk singing and hay rides Mr. Turner said. Bobby Gimby, the singer of "Ca-na-da" will be there for the closing finale.

Various ethnic groups will attend on each of the nights. Ukrainian, Japanese, Sauguen Indians and Jewish groups will demonstrate some of their traditional dances and songs.

The general public will be allowed in at regular Kelso admission prices between 2 p.m. and 9 p.m. daily. The program will get underway this Saturday with the official opening, conducted by the Lt. Governor of Ontario, the Hon. W. Ross Macdonald, at 3 p.m.

Other highlights of the venture include daily trips to the Lakeview Power Plant and the C.N.E., hiking on the Bruce Trail, swimming, boating, carving, beadwork, leathercraft, model railroading, slot car racing, sports competitions, a motorcycle show, water bombing and parachute rescue demonstrations, dog handling and sheet shooting.

Music will be provided by the Guelph Citadel Salvation Army and the Burlington Band as well as drill bands from the U.S.A.

Planners overlooked next to nothing when they planned the colossal event. The site will be complete with everything from a makeshift hospital to showers, trading post, canteen, bank and post office. The city will be governed by a group of officials in a structure very similar to a town council.

Mr. Turner explained all the facilities were an indication of the new type of Scouting. "The agenda will be made to fit the boy rather than the boy fitting

the agenda," he added. "We want to give the boys something they are interested in."

Due to the number of people involved, special health and safety precautions have had to be taken to stay within the Health Department's restrictions. Besides the 3,000 Scouts registering for the week, another 3,000 will visit the Jamboree for half a day.
