New medical officer in Peel

GLENN WILLIAMS - Dr. Sally L. Hemming of Glen Williams is the newly appointed medical officer of health for Peel County. She replaces Dr. R.S. Khanna.

Dr. Hemming is expecting her fifth child and will not assume duties until late October of early November. Until then, she will work on a "sporadic basis."

She is Scottish and received her medical degree (MB Ch. B) from the University of Glasgow. After interning for a year in Scotland, she and her husband moved to Canada and she completed internship in Vancouver. She has been in general practice for ten years. In discussing her new position Dr. Hemming said, "As is every doctor we are in the business of preventive medicine. It is very important for us to provide an effective educational service to the community through each family unit."
