Buy talk time at bargain rate

For the first time in Canada a long distance rate blan will soon offer province-wide telephone calling at bargain rates to a majority of residence customers. Called Econo-Pak, it went into effect on Sunday, August 18, for more than two million Bell Canada individual line telephone

Individual line customers, who enjoy unlimited local calling for a flat monthly charge, will be able to buy an hour or more of long distance conversation time to any humber of points in their home province at the special rate of \$10 for the first hour and \$2 for

each additional quarter hour. This new Econo-Pak rate will apply to Direct Distance Dialed calls placed any day, between noon and 8 p.m. Thus it offers a special benefit to customers who prefer to make calls in the afternoon, rather than late at night. It also provides a big saving for those who make many in-province calls to distant
