Irvine will assist each morning to improve the work of the primary and junior students.  
The primary and junior departments of the school will have lessons from 9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m., with recess from 10:30 a.m. to 10:45 a.m., and then from 1 p.m. to 3:45 p.m. with recess from 2:30 p.m. to 2:45 p.m.  
Unfinished work, remedial work and detentions could keep a student in school from 3:45 p.m. to 4 p.m.  
The senior division (grades seven and eight) will operate more than ever before like the high school. The five teachers will teach their own subjects under the rotary system.  
The seniors will start school at 8:55 a.m., continuing to 11:50 a.m. with a five-minute break at 10:30 a.m. The afternoon program commences at 1 p.m. lasting to 3:40 p.m. with a five-minute break at 2:30 p.m. Unfinished work, extra help and detentions will be from 3:40 p.m. to 4 p.m.  
The special physical education program will run from 4 p.m. to 4:40 p.m. Monday to Thursday afternoons, supervised by J. Kavanagh.  
School patrols will be on duty from 8:30 to 8:50; 11:40 to 12:40; 12:55 to 3:40 to 4:10.  
Oral French will be introduced at the school for the first time. Mrs. Helene Reynolds will teach oral French as well as English literature to the grade seven and eight students. She will teach at both public schools.  
Mrs. Marlene Titon returns to the both schools as art supervisor. Glenn Banks continues as music supervisor. Lorenzo Hill teaches the senior special opportunity class and Miss Mary Golem the junior special opportunity class. Students from both schools come to the stone school for these classes.  
Mrs. Kathleen Hannah will teach home economics each afternoon and Douglas Hines industrial arts each afternoon.  
Kindergarten-primary teachers are Mrs. Helen Rogwaldson and Miss Suzanne Sinclair.

be available. However, staggered classes will now have to operate for five months.  
The change in boundary was necessitated by housing development in the Lakeview and Cobble Hill Subdivisions. If the boundary line had not been changed, there would be staggered classes at Robert Little School which would have had to operate for the full ten months of the school year as all the classrooms will be occupied at that school this fall.  
The board realize that staggered classes may inconvenience certain families but trust that they will appreciate the problem and will co-operate fully. Only senior students will be affected; the other grades will operate as formerly from 9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and from 1 p.m. to 3:45 p.m. In spite of the board's planning to provide the necessary accommodation, it is now anticipated that it will not be ready before February 1, 1969.  
Principal Elmer Smith explains that Grade VIII pupils will attend school from 8 a.m. to 12:30 daily. Grade VII pupils will attend school from 1 p.m. until 5:30 daily. Both these classes will take home economics and shop during time that they are off regular classes in order to bring up required hours of instruction to the proper level.  
Most Grade VI pupils will attend the morning sessions. However, some Grade VI students and some Grade V students will attend P.M. sessions. Most of the Grade V students, however, will be unaffected.

increase of 5% over the students in attendance in June of this year. Because of new students moving into the area actual enrolment is never certain until school begins.  
Because of resignations, two people from last year's staff have been promoted to the list of Department Heads. Mr. Andrews will assume the headship of the Physical Education Department and Mr. McGillivray has become the Head of the Commercial Department. The other Department Heads are as follows: Mr. Coats, Mathematics; Mr. Curtis, Science; Mr. Lambourn, English; Mr. Martindale, Geography; Mrs. Reed, Modern Languages; Mr. Swallow, History.  
A total of six staff members have been hired this year. H.L. Goodman will assume the position of teacher of Physics and Mathematics beginning September 3. Mr. Goodman has received a B.Sc. degree from the University of Toronto. He is a graduate of the Winter Course at the Ontario College of Education.  
Mrs. K.L. Hurst will teach English and History this year. Mrs. Hurst obtained her B.A. degree from the University of Guelph. She has completed the initial Summer Course at the Ontario College of Education.  
J.W. May will teach Geography and one class each of Man in Society and World Politics. Mr. May possesses a B.A. degree from the University of Western Ontario. He has completed the initial Summer Course at the Ontario College of Education.  
B.S. Shean will teach Commercial subjects this year. Mr. Shean holds a B.A. degree from McMaster University and has completed the initial summer course at the Ontario



College of Education.  
B.D. Skerrett will assume the position of co-ordinator of the Guidance Department. Mr. Skerrett holds a B.A. degree from Acadia University. He has been in charge of Guidance at Garson Falconbridge Secondary School in Sudbury for the past three years.  
Mrs. B. J. Warner will teach History and girls' Physical Education. She possesses a B.A. degree from the University of Guelph and has just completed the initial summer course at the Ontario College of Education. Mrs. Warner has also completed three years of study in Physical Education at McGill University.  
The total number of teachers at the Acton District High School is 26, including Principal Hansen and Vice-Principal Bray.  
The secretarial staff involves three people, Mrs. A. Pendleton, Mrs. C. Freuler and a third person yet to be hired. The custodial staff remains the same, R. Speilvogel, Ken McKinnon and N. Robertson.  
This year for the first time, German will be offered at the Grade 13 level. The language program in the school includes the teaching of French, German and Latin through to the end of Grade 13.  
Another change which is now one year old involves the treatment of English as an optional subject in Grade 13. Beginning this year, History has become an optional subject in Grades 12 and 13. This leaves only English and Physical Education on the list of compulsory subjects in middle school.  
A student beginning grade 11, five-year Arts and Science will

choose five or six from the following list of optional subjects: History, French, German, Latin, Mathematics, Physics, Business Organization and Management, Geography, or one option of the four-year program.

Beginning Grade 11, four-year Arts and Science Branch, a student will choose five or six from the following list of optional subjects: History, Mathematics, Biology, Marketing, Agriculture, Man in Society, Industrial Arts or Home Economics.  
Prior to this year, group Guidance has been taught at the Grade 9 level only. However, beginning this year it will be presented to Grade 10, four-year Arts and Science, and to students in Grade 12.  
Customarily group Guidance is presented one period every six days. However, to add continuity of the program it will be presented one period a day for six consecutive days at one or two intervals during the fall term. This will allow for a concerted effort to be placed on considerations such as employment, further education, sociological and other problems

at a time when it will be of greatest value.  
For the first few days of school the bus routes will remain as they were last June. Changes will be made if they are required.  
This year the school will operate with two sets of examinations instead of the customary three. The first set will be written in the latter part of January, the second set in June. There will be no exemptions from writing the June examinations.  
The time gained by dropping the third set of examinations will allow the school to increase its effective teaching time by 5 to 10 per cent. The trend toward increasing the emphasis of term work will be continued.  
This year, at least one-half of the mark in each subject will be based on a day-to-day achievement in tests and assignments. The increased emphasis on daily achievement places a new importance on attendance. The school will continue this year with its system of monthly reporting to parents on individual student progress.  
This year, reporting will be done in the form of a Monthly
