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**"Witch hunt" charged**

**Reconsider Sheridan appointments**

A suggestion that the County Council not make any further appointments to the Board of Governors of Sheridan College, was delayed and referred back for further study at the monthly Halton County Council meeting.

The resolution in the finance committee minutes proposed that effective in January, representatives to the Sheridan College Board from County Council not be paid their per diem rate. It was also suggested that when current appointments expire no further appointments be made.

Acton Reeve H. Hinton, currently a county member on the Board, defended the action to discontinue paying fees but heatedly opposed the suggestion the county would not continue to make appointments.

The Sheridan Board is made up of two representatives appointed by Halton and two by Peel, with the balance named by the province. To the Warden's suggestion that one or two members wouldn't have much say in events, Reeve Hinton entered heated objection.

He assured members that he had been instrumental in the Board seeking out the present principal who had not even applied for the position, and he

also obtained the services of J. H. Depew as solicitor who had a keen interest in this type of school. "The County has had a great deal of say about the college and can continue to have it if it continues its appointments", the Acton Reeve maintained.

Deputy-Reeve W. Gillies of Oakville, objected to the elimination of the per diem rate, since it precluded membership by some people. Reeve Hinton suggested that was a negative approach. He noted none of the provincial representatives are paid and the labor representative is not paid; Deputy-Reeve Gillies noted the labor appointment to the board, was a Conservative, not a labor appointment.

Reeve Hinton vehemently protested the "witch hunts and back biting" that were going on at the county level and said "if I can do anything about this I will expose myself to any extent to clear it up."

Council received several other objections to the proposal that no further appointments would be made by the county to Sheridan. It was finally agreed the matter would be referred back to the personnel committee for reconsideration.

**Urge Manor extension**

Halton County Council was urged to plan an extension to Halton Centennial Manor's Martin House while proceeding with plans for a site in the south of the county. Reeve H. Hinton urged this course when he noted the present Martin House bed care accommodation was filled up.

"If we delay, we may be in the position where we don't have the facilities required", the Acton Reeve noted. He commented that kitchen, heating and elevator facilities at Martin House had all been designed for an addition.

Reeve W. Coulter of Nassagaweya acknowledged Martin House was filled up but six weeks ago there were 60 beds available for normal care in Pettit House. He suggested it was a case of balancing up the facilities required with what existed, and some special bed care patients would be accommodated in Pettit House.

**Eye Milton water**

**Engage consultants**

A committee from Nassagaweya and Esqueping Council met last week and approved the services of R. V. Anderson and Associates, Toronto, as consultants in building a new water line to Milton Heights.

Reeve of Nassagaweya William Coulter said he hoped to arrange a meeting with Milton Council

September 4, to discuss the matter and to ascertain if Milton has enough water to feed the area in need.

The people in Milton Heights and Peru have been bothered by polluted wells for some time. The Halton County Health Unit condemned the water as unfit for human consumption without treatment about two years ago.

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
