The following is an excerpt taken directly from the current Summary of Hunting Regulations.

To obtain a hunting licence one must:

(a) present before an issuer of licences a previous licence duly completed for renewal or

(b) present proof of previous hunting experience in the form of an old or current licence for any Province, State, or Country before an issuer of licences, or

(c) if under the age of 20 years complete a course in hunter safety training given by a qualified instructor before applying to take a hunting licence examination, or

(d) present before an issuer of licences a certificate issued by a hunting examiner as a result of passing a hunting licence examination.
