**22,000 attend Steam-Era**

It had to play a cat-and-mouse game with the weatherman all day Monday, but the 1968 edition of Steam-Era, the eighth annual reunion of the Ontario Steam and Antique Preservers Association, was one of the club's most successful shows on record. The event was staged Friday, Saturday and Monday in Milton Fair Grounds, and when it ended Monday evening officials estimated total attendance at around 22,000.

The record-holder was the 1966 edition which saw an estimated attendance of close to 30,000. Last year it fell to around 21,000 despite perfect weather, and officials then blamed the decline in attendance on a welter of other centennial events arranged for the same weekend.

While sunny skies beamed down on the fair grounds Friday and Saturday, Monday threatened to be a washout with heavy rains throughout the district Sunday evening and through the night. The grounds were wet and muddy in places when the show opened Monday morning, but by noon Old Sol was blessing Steam-Era with his presence fairly steadily and the crowds began to pour in the gates.

The sun lasted until after 4.30 p.m. when black rain clouds filled the sky. The daily parade in front of the grandstand had started at 4 p.m. and the tail end began. Within minutes the track had turned to mud, rivers of brown water flowed in the ditches, and the whole fair grounds appeared to be deserted as the estimated peak crowd of 13,000 flocked to shelter in cars, tents, the grandstand and other buildings.

The rain didn't last more than half an hour, but when it let up there was a steady stream toward the gates as spectators headed homeward. Normally the show would continue to run until at least 7 p.m.

"We're lucky it didn't come down any earlier," a smiling Steam-Era president Gordon Rayer of Milton said later. The afternoon parade is always a highlight of the day's activities when every piece of movable machinery in the grounds circles the race track and files past a packed grandstand. Monday's crowd was overflowing the grandstand, the bleacher seats and every other available seat, and people were lined up five deep along the sides of the race track for the big event.

Monday evening club officers looked over figures from the gate receipts and decided each day of the three-day reunion saw larger crowds than last year. They estimate there were over 1,000 on the grounds Friday, about 8,000 on Saturday and 13,000 Monday. Despite the competition from the Canadian National Exhibition and the big cottage closing, and back-to-school weekend traffic, Steam-Era continues to survive and grow, a director noted.

This year's reunion featured a variety of new equipment, plus many of the old stand-bys that continue to draw crowds to the show. An equipment count showed there were 27 steam engines on the grounds, aged from 1885 to 1928, and featuring both well-known and rare types such as Waterloo,

Offences against Ontario Liquor Laws were noted as the most dominant item entered in occurrence book at the Acton Detachment, during the week, August 25 to 31. 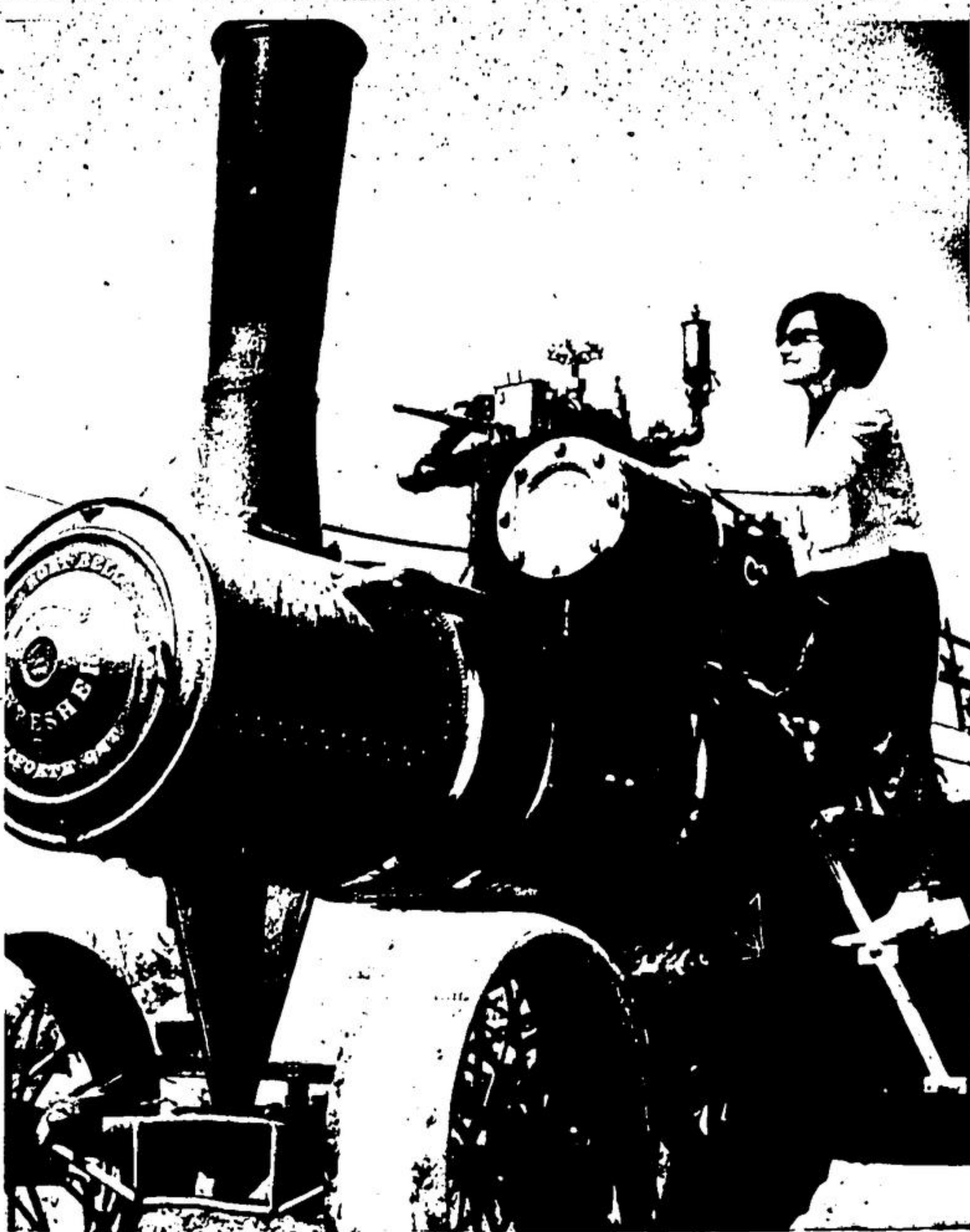
