New type faces

Electronics in our newsroom speed up paper production

Electronics and a rapidly expanding technology in the field of graphic arts has played a new role in bringing you this week's issue of your local paper.

You may notice for instance there are very few (if any) hyphens at the ends of lines in the text or news columns of this issue. This has come about with the introduction of new equipment in the composition area which has a tendency to dazzle as you see it in operation.

Now keyboard operators type the news and, as well as producing the normal typewritten copy, they are transmitting impulses to a magnetic tape, much like that on a tape recorder.

When the tape is played out through an output machine, a small rapidly revolving disc of type prints out the columns you read at 150 words a minute—neatly aligned on the front and back end to produce the columns of type.

If errors have been detected at the original typing a new tape is produced, including only the lines containing the errors. The two tapes are placed on opposite ends of the print-out machine and the equipment will merge the material so the columns printed are correct.

There are many features of the equipment that make it superior to that which is being replaced. There is a greater variety of type faces available and the material printed out can be shaped around pictures or set in longer lines.

Last week's issue included the new type faces and this week's issue is being produced on the

IBM Selectric Composer as well. Operators from the Acton plant have taken special training in Hamilton the the equipment and you'll be seeing an improved typography in the issues to come. The more readable typefaces will be a benefit to readers and, it is hoped, will give you even more enjoyment from the hours you spend with your local newspaper.

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Warns regional government studies will break up Halton

A current study of regional government on a county basis may force the break-up of the county, Deputy Reeve W. Gillies of Oakville warned Halton County Council.

views of members. "If we go for a single county unit, all we would be doing is shoring up the county government and I don't think it can be done", he declared.

Reeve H. Hinton of Acton defended the county committee's ability to prepare background information for submission to the county council. "We're only doing a survey to present the facts to the county", he noted.

"As an individual I don't think Oakville and Burlington will get city status. The Department of Municipal Affairs is showing a definite lack of interest in granting city status", he declared.

Civilian Telex operator busy man at Milton O.P.P.

For 19-year-old James Mara, Milton O.P.P. is one of three area detachments where he has been employed as a telex operator.

Although Mara calls Hamilton home, he has previously been employed at the District Headquarters in Burlington and the General Headquarters in Toronto.

In Toronto, Mara worked on Telex full time and he learned radio procedures in Burlington. In Milton, he handles Telex,

radio and telephone calls, all chores formerly handled by an on-duty officer. With Mara handling all the front office business the force can put another officer on the road. He commutes from his Hamilton home daily.

The Milton O.P.P. cover the entire North Halton rural area. Although he finds the work interesting, Mara has ambitions of becoming an O.P.P. Constable when he turns 21 years of age, (the minimum age for an O.P.P. Constable).

Telex is relatively new to Milton. An average of 200 messages are sent from the Milton office per month, each of which is recorded on a chart showing the time and destination of the message.

The machines are common in many of the forces in Ontario and where a small town does not have one they work in co-operation with a neighboring force that does.

Messages can be despatched anywhere in Canada within a matter of seconds. Depending on its destination will be channelled through either District Headquarters in Burlington or General Headquarters in Toronto and then to the detachment or series of detachments desired. Codes designate the origination of the message and the area it is going to.

Messages can be sent to American stations by channelling them through Western Union where they are despatched from Detroit or Boston.

The machine itself resembles a typewriter keyboard. It can both despatch and receive messages at a rate of about 65 words per minute and reach all Ontario or Canada if necessary within a matter of seconds.

Before Telex, messages were sent by phone, radio or written word. The speed and ease messages can be sent is a great advantage in the communication system so necessary in police work.
