Root reunion at Beamsville

Some 50 decendants of John and Nancy Root who pioneered in Erin Township in the County of Wellington before the City of Guelph was founded travelled to Beamsville Baptist Church to hold their Reunion on Sunday afternoon, August 18. Beamsville or Clinton Township is historic ground as far as the Root Family is concerned.

Henry Root (Rott) the oldest son of a Mennonite preacher in Bucks County, Pennsylvania. crossed the border in 1799 and established his home in Clinton Township. He married Mary Overholt, a daughter of Staats Overholt. Staats Overholt was one of the loyalists who crossed the line in the late 1770's or early 1780's.

The decendants of Staats Overholt and Henry Root who were present at the reunion spent some time looking over the cemetery, where Henry Root and Jacob Root stones still stand. There are 13 Roots buried in that cemetery although most of the stones have been removed. Following the supper hour Bert Awrey, the president, presided for a program. Alvin Root of Rockwood is treasurer.

John Root, M.P.P. spoke briefly about the history of the Root family. He said that Beamsville is in the centre of an historic area. 
