the desires of the community and plan to accommodate them. Clerk-Administrator Jack McGeachie said the town could make no decision on its future until residents know whether they can "stand on their own two feet" or will be saddled with regional government. Mr. McGeachie said the first alternative would make the town self-sufficient.

There was a chorus of Amens from both panel and audience. Reeve Bert Hinton felt the meeting was getting off the track of the transportation study. He lectured panellists on the role government could play in Acton's growth.

"These are provocative statements for laymen," said Reeve Hinton of the projections made. "The idea Acton may have 200,000 people is far out.

Mr. Hinton suggested to 60-40 or any other given ratio was a thing of the past, stating a list of assets and liabilities would give a more "valid effect." "I hate to see the 60-10 ratio drilled into the community.

Mr. Hinton also suggested goals plans one only aggravated the situation we already have and plan four was "way out." Goals plans two and three made more sense to him, he felt.


The reeve concluded by asking the chairman to keep the meeting in the context of the study.

Chairman Dubyreplied that the meeting's subject was not just the MTARTS study. Statements on development were deliberately provocative to encourage participation by those in attendance.

Mr. Duby wound the meeting up by emphasizing that the provincial government exercised a great deal of control over development and was seeking advice. "This is our opportunity," he said, "to let them know how we feel about the future of Acton."

"When they determine what will happen here they'll take our suggestions into account. They won't be able to unless they are


