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## Milton, townships discuss water for Heights, Peru area

"Do you want to supply the people of Milton Heights with water", Esquising Reeve George Currie asked Milton Council Wednesday when he appeared with Deputy-Reeve Tom Hill and Nassagaweya Reeve W. Coulter and Deputy-Reeve W. Hoey.

Mayor Brian Best pressed for an answer to how much water and after considerable discussion, that was where the matter was left.

The joint Esquising-Nassagaweya delegation promised to discuss with engineers the potential demand of the area,

construction costs and most suitable route from the town's Kelso water line.

The meeting was to discuss the possibility of providing municipal water for the Milton Heights-Peru area where wells have become polluted. The area is largely in Esquising Township with a smaller portion in Nassagaweya.

Reeve Coulter told the meeting there were 106 households in the area with an estimated 400 people, and a preliminary estimate of water consumption was 28,000 gallons daily. He reviewed one proposed route for the water line from the town main at Highway 401 south along the Milton Heights or Town Line road through the Heights. Another extension would be made from Milton's west boundary to serve the Peru area.

Base Line road to Peru was also compounded by the fact houses on the south side of the road were in Oakville and those on the north in Esquising.

Deputy Reeve Hill of Esquising suggested if the Oakville people were interested in the service they would have to come to Esquising. The township wasn't planning any joint meeting with Oakville council.

## Report increased registration in Erin township schools

Erin Township School Area reported an increase in registration at the three schools opening day.

A new wrinkle in the township's three schools this year - kindergarten classes - attracted approximately 90 new students. Kindergarten classes operate all day at Brisbane and half days at Ospringe and Hillsburg.

Total registration at the three schools is Ospringe 240, Hillsburg 265 and Brisbane 288.

J. Bruce Macpherson heads the staff at Ospringe school which has four new teachers this fall: Mrs. Flewelling, teaching grades one and three; Mrs. Stoddart, kindergarten; Mrs. McKinnon, grade two; Mrs. Buchanan, grades three and six.

Members of the staff returning from last year are Mrs. Sinclair, teaching grade four; Mrs. C. Denny, grade five; Mrs. Nellis, grade seven; Mrs. Anderson, principal's relief and Mrs. Cureton, one day a week.

P. Donaldson and A. King are principals of the Brisbane and Hillsburg schools respectively.

## Oakville enrolment up

OAKVILLE School enrolment goes up each year in Oakville and the total enrolment in public and secondary schools when the fall term opened hit a new high of 14,095. This included 9,009 in public schools, up 300 from a year ago, and 4,186 in high schools, which is up just 25 from last year. Another 250 secondary school registrations are still expected.

The north end schools, Percy Merry and Snider's, have 421 and 219 students respectively. White Oaks High School is the largest secondary school with 1,338 enrolled to date.
